



Replying to your letter of recent date, you are advised that the applications for participation in the Eastern Cherokee fund have not been taken up for final consideration, as the Court of Claims in its order of April 29, 1907, has extended the time for the filing of applications to August 31, 1907, and until the applications have all been filed it will be impossible to give final consideration to any of them, or to state just how much each successful claimant will receive.

As there are already over 28,000 applications on file and the claimants are widely scattered through the United States, it will necessarily take considerable time to have all of these cases adjudicated, and until they are so determined no money can be distributed.

Please advise this office the date of the birth and the date of the death of Lucy Jack, as requested in our letter to you of May 22, 1907.

deposes and says:

Byles P.O.
My name is Sally Jack. My age is 38 years. My mother was Sallie Sexton, aka Sallie Lambert before marriage. I have not heard from my mother in two years. There were two children older than me. I never heard my mother say how old she was when George was born. My mother is something like 76 or 77. She was never married before she married James Sexton. I never heard my mother say where she was born. I was living two miles west of Newport when I first remember. I have been living in Monroe County about ten years. I knew my grandmother Hony Lambert. She died just before I moved away. She was a very old woman. I have heard my mother say that she had Indian blood and that she was half-Cherokee. My grandmother was a whole Indian. I never heard my mother or my grandmother say that they got any money as Indians. I think I would have heard it if they had received it. I never heard of my mother or my grandmother living among the Indians. Martha Sexton lived in South Carolina the last I heard of her. My mother was in Cooke County close to Bybes P. O. I have written there and have not had any answer. Mr. John Lovell might know about my Indian blood.
