If the claim has not been approved if you will kindly write me what is necessary for it to pass muster I will do my level hest to obtain 4.

I could myself make affidavit that Waters was not a negro. Thether or not he was a full blooded Cherokee I do not personally know as I am entirely too young. My father who is 63 years of age says that he has known or did know Waters all his life and he was never a slave and that he always regarded him as a full blooded Cherokee Indian.
