JOHN ROACH DEAD.

THE CANCER IN HIS THROAT HAS
DONE ITS WORK.

The Great Shipbuilder Passes Quietly
Away—A Horrible Murder by Girls—
Miraculous Recovery—Drunken Con-
ductor Causes His Own Death.

NEW YORK, January 10.—John Roach, the famous ship builder, died at 8 o'clock this morning. He had been ill for several weeks, suffering from cancer of the throat. His affliction was similar to that of the late Gen. Grant.

The cancerous growth which caused Mr. Roach's death had eaten its way into the side of the neck below the angle of the jaw, involving the large arteries. For the past few days Mr. Roach suffered great pain, and to relieve him large doses of morphine were injected, and he was unconscious most of the time. Mr. Roach was born in Mitchell town, county Cork, Ireland.

A National Exhibition

The outlook for the first annual of the National Poultry and Bee-tion beginning on the 15th is encouraging. Prominent breeders from East and West, and in Canada, entries of thorough bred fowls, in opinion of the secretary that between 2,000 and 3,000 fowls will be on exhibition, one hundred entries of pigeons made. Mr. B. N. Pierce, of New York, will be the judge of the fowls.

The Bench Show will also be fine. The association is a member of the American Kennel Club, and will be conducted according to its rules. The Gate City Kennel, of Atlanta, and Chestnut Hill Kennels, of Philadelphia, have fine dogs on exhibition.

Mr. A. A. McDuffie, of Athens, will enter a large number, including several Bernards.

Major J. M. Taylor, of Cleveland, and T. Farrer Rockham, of New Jersey, will be the judges.

The executive committee will award gold medals for pointer and setter under nine months of age. The twenty-five or thirty in Atlanta likely enter for this premium.

The railroads have given prizes for parties attending the exhibition, and attendance will in all probability be large. Athens, Tenn., alone has seventy entries of fine fowls, and a large delegation of her citizens. This will be the first thing of the kind in the South, and it is destined to reach the whole country. Atlanta has her interest in the exhibition, and \$1,000 in gold medals and a large special prizes.

The executive committee is now arranging the necessary details, and
