

THE FUNERAL TO-MORROW

INTERMENT OF THE REMAINS OF CHIEF JUSTICE JAS. JACKSON

**In Oakland Cemetery—The Services to be
at the First Methodist Church—Tribute
of Governor Gordon—Action of the Bar
of Other Cities, Etc.**

Yesterday, Governor Gordon issued the following order, relative to the death of Georgia's loved and venerated Chief Justice:

STATE OF GEORGIA, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, }
ATLANTA, Ga., January 14, 1887. }

It becomes my painful duty to officially announce the death of Hon. James Jackson, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Georgia. The life of this eminent citizen is an important part of Georgia's history; as represented in her legislature, and in the federal congress, as judge of the Superior Court, and as associate justice of the Supreme Court, he has worn out his life in her service, and left a shining example for the imitation of the young men of his state. There was not a vice which his example did not condemn, not a virtue which his life did not exemplify and adorn. Calumny could not detract from nor eulogy add to his fame. His historic lineage, his moral excellence, his intellectual pre-eminence, his public service made him illustrious. It is only a just tribute to his memory that his native state, in whose service he lived and died, should appear as a mourner in his obsequies; that a sovereign mother should bow at the tomb of such a son.

It is therefore ordered, That the foregoing be entered upon the permanent records of this department; that the national flag over the public buildings be placed at half mast, and the different departments of the state government be closed until Monday morning. J. B. GORDON, Governor.

The choir will sing appropriate dirges.
