

MR. STEPHEN TERRY'S DEATH.

He Passes Away at His Home in Tavares, Florida.

Mr. Stephen Terry, a brother of Mr. George Terry, secretary of the Atlanta water works company, died yesterday morning at his home in Tavares, Florida.

Mr. Terry has for months been a sufferer from consumption, which finally resulted in his death.

He was well known in this city, where he was born and reared. He graduated from the boys' high school of this city, and some years afterwards removed to Tavares, where he has taught school for some time.

He was about thirty years of age, and leaves a wife and several children.

His death is a sad blow to his friends in Atlanta, who remember him as a brilliant and promising young man.

Mr. George Terry, his brother, left the city yesterday for Tavares, where the funeral will take place.

A LITTLE CHILD'S DEATH.

Little Emmie Palmer, the niece and adopted daughter of Mr. H. E. W. Palmer, president of the Houston-Thompson Electric Light company of this city, died yesterday morning at Bon Air, a small station on the Georgia Southern and Florida railroad.

The little girl was on a visit to her old home at Bon Air, when she was taken suddenly with a severe attack of pneumonia, which yesterday caused her death.

Although only three years old, she was unusually bright and smart, and was, previous to her illness, full of life and vivacity, and was loved by all with whom she came in contact.

The remains will pass through Atlanta at 6 o'clock this afternoon, and will be taken from here to Greensboro for burial.

DEATH OF A WEALTHY NEGRO.
