## DEATH ON A RAILROAD.

**A Negro Who Was Running Away from the Police Killed Last Night.**

Lee Jones, a negro boy, was found under the Jones avenue bridge last night with both legs and both arms horribly crushed, his skull broken in several places and his face badly cut and mashed. He did not recover sufficiently to tell how he was hurt, but died shortly after he was found.

Last week Lee Jones was arrested by the police for having left ashes in a wooden box over Price's shoe store, thereby causing a fire.

He put up ten dollars as a bond for his appearance in court, but has not been seen by the officers since then, until he was found last night.

Upon investigation it was learned that Lee had told a friend on the Georgia Pacific freight train, which left just before he was found that he was going to Birmingham, as the police were looking for him.

It is thought he was beating his way, when he fell off and was killed.

The coroner held an inquest and exonerated the railroad, saying that the negro came to his death by his own carelessness.
