

# MR. JOHN REYNOLDS' WILL

HE LEFT AN ESTATE VALUED AT \$100,000.

The Bulk of His Property Goes to His Brother in Marietta.

The will of the late John G. Reynolds has been filed with Ordinary Calhoun for probate in common form.

He left property valued at \$100,000.

\$10,000 worth of the property by the will goes to Mrs. Reynolds, and the rest, \$90,000, or possibly more, is left to Mr. Fletcher Reynolds of Marietta, Mr. John Reynolds' brother.

Mr. Fletcher Reynolds, by the will, is made the executor.

Mrs. Reynolds is quite wealthy in her own name. She gave in property in Fulton county alone valued at \$47,000. Mr. Reynolds gave in property in this county valued at \$44,340.

In addition to this, he owned considerable property in DeKalb and other counties, as well as a very valuable orange grove near Oviola in Orange county, Florida.

Mr. Fletcher Reynolds, his brother to whom he left the bulk of his property, lives in Marietta.

He is a gentleman who possesses the confidence of all who know him and has many friends in Atlanta, where he lived for a number of years. He is now engaged in farming in a modest way near Marietta, and last year it will be remembered, he lost a young daughter, who was killed, together with a visitor to the family, by being thrown from a carriage attached to a pair of runaway horses.

## GAVE HIMSELF UP.

Mr. R. A. Williams, the Well-Known Emigrant Agent Under Bond.

Mr. R. A. Williams, the well-known emigration agent, this morning surrendered himself to Chief of Police Connolly and was immediately released on an acceptable bond of \$1,000.

The charge against Mr. Williams was violation of the emigration laws and was made against him by the people of Montezuma, N. C. It is charged that Mr. Williams sold tickets to negroes wishing to emigrate from that section to Texas in violation of the laws of the land and warrants were issued for his arrest and lodged with the officers here.

Since that was done Mr. Williams has been absent from the city and only returned last night. The first thing this morning he called upon his lawyers, who proceeded to police headquarters and filed with Chief Connolly a bond for \$1,000, the amount demanded. That officer approved it.

"This thing is only done," said Mr. Williams, "to scare the negroes so they won't leave the section. The farmers up there have been getting their labor done for practically nothing, and they don't want to see the negroes leave. Under this charge which they have trumped up against me they could arrest every passenger agent in Atlanta. The case amounts to nothing, only it occasions me a little inconvenience."

## A RECEIVER APPOINTED

To Take Charge of the Business of the Logan & Graham Hardware Co.

This morning Judge Richard H. Clark appointed Mr. J. R. Logan, the president of the Logan & Graham Hardware company, as permanent receiver. He will convert the stock of the company into cash for the benefit of creditors.

The receiver was appointed on the application of Messrs. Rosser & Carter, attorneys for the King Hardware company, Heck & Gregg Hardware company, Bain & Kirkpatrick, and other creditors.

Their claims amount to \$111.02.

The petition says that Logan & Graham Hardware company has executed a mortgage of \$2,000 to the Maddox & Rucker Banking company, and that its assets are in excess of the mortgage, but there are other creditors whose claims will amount to more than the remaining assets, and for fear they will be misapplied a receiver was asked for.
