### A SURPRISE.

Tuesday during the noon hour of court, Col. Weir Boyd of Dahlonega, addressed a large audience in the court house. From a man with a democratic record of forty years standing, his speech was a great surprise to his many White county democratic friends.

In some points we heartily endorse the views of the venerable Colonel, but consider his a truck upon the president and house, as yet untimely. When after the lapse of sufficient time for safe legislation, nothing has been accomplished, then we will join the grand chorus demanding that our ballots be not violated. But now, no. Two months, or four or six months is not too long time to devote to the tearing down of a financial system, that has been thirty years building, and which when done, must be built up again after a different design.

The passage of any bill, totally disrupting by one stroke our present financial policy, but as it is, would result in the most disastrous money panic the country has ever known.

In the resolutions, which appear below, and which were read by Col. Boyd, and almost unanimously adopted by the assemblage, the broad shoulders of the president are made to bear the heavy responsibility of all this delay, and filibustering in house and senate, when in fact he has nothing to do with it. The president has his own view of the silver question, certainly; but every democrat who knows his record, sees him in precisely the same attitude he was four and eight years ago.

Just now, we would promulgate the doctrine of patience, and after proper time, if our leaders have betrayed us, then it is we would upbraid and condemn. It is very reported that Col. Boyd has an eye on a seat in our next state senate, as Lumpkin county is entitled to the seat, but next time, and that he is taking a policy course. That may do in Lumpkin county, but it won't work here, for we must know just where to place our finger on him now, before either party takes him up. Come off the fence, colonel; we believe you to have been always a staunch democrat, but it does strike us most forcibly now, that praise of Tom Watson, and the utterance of the words to the effect that Tom Watson or some man that believes nearly like him would fill the next governors chair, indicates that the colonel is a little more than half way over on the other side.

Below are resolutions read and adopted.

Whereas, it is the constitutional right and privilege of American citizens, at all times, to promulgate and publish, as much as they see fit, and full publicity of their minds on any, or all public men, and measures which may and do affect the interest and welfare of the people. The exercise of this right, becomes very essential, when the people are in a crisis on the verge of the present time. The president and U. S. Senate and representatives in congress and all other officers, State or Federal, are not matters, but only servants of the people, and are morally and politically bound, to execute the will of the people, as far as the same has been expressed.

Resolved, That we strongly condemn the attitude and efforts of president Cleveland and all other members of the cabinet, and of congress who cooperate with him in refusing to be mediately providing relief to the people, in the free coinage of silver, and restoring it to the constitutional status, as fixed by the fathers of the republic, and as pledged by the platform of all the parties in the late presidential contest.

Resolved, That we respectfully and earnestly request our present congress to quit wasting their time on immaterial side issues, and address themselves to the repeal of the 100 per cent law on state banks, modify the tariff and other remedial legislation in the adjustment of our financial system.

The foregoing is not to be considered as a vote to be taken by the people, and representatives who have so manfully opposed and acted in the senate in favor of the free coinage of silver. We hope they will speak on this subject, as rather than silver should be further debated.

Resolved, That the secretary of this meeting furnish the *Cavalier* with a copy of the foregoing for publication, and that other news papers in our state which are favorable to these views advanced, be requested to publish.

### A WONDERFUL REVIVAL.

One of the most wonderful meetings ever held in White county, or North-east Georgia, has just closed at Mossy Creek church, of which Rev. H. M. Newton is pastor.

The whole number of conversions ran up to 121, and the accessions to the Methodist church numbered 77. Many others of the converted will unite with the different churches.

This has been a wonderful meeting indeed. Feuds of years standing have been settled, indignities removed, religious bigotry dropped its head, and sectarianism was made ashamed.

Prayer meetings were organized by bands of young men and young ladies, and it is stated that every student of Mossy Creek High School was converted. Nine infants were baptised Sunday morning, at the request of newly converted parents.

Cleveland circuit has been most wonderfully blessed this year. All collections for missions, bachelors, widows and orphans are paid to date, and the fact that there has been two hundred accessions to the church, and over two hundred and fifty conversions, shows the light of a new era has dawned.

Every protracted meetings are to be held soon, one at Nacoochee and one at Zion.

### A Temperance Lecture.

Tuesday night the people of Cleveland enjoyed the rare treat of listening to one of the masters of eloquence, in the person of Hon. M. G. Boyd, of Dahlonega, who delivered a lecture on the temperance question.

The Baptist church, where he delivered his lecture, was crowded, and he held his audience for an hour and a half, eager listeners to the truths, he told them of the danger attending the youth and manhood of this mountain country. His talk was neither theoretical nor hearsay, but he spoke as a man who has experienced all the evil effects of intemperance, and who by the help of a most wonderful cure, has lifted himself out of the most horrible condition, on only one year.

That he may yet live to do the great work he is fitted to do, and that the long lost hopes, ambitions and anticipations of his bright and promising young manhood—all the brighter and sweeter for being once lost and found again—may be fully realized as the wish of his hundreds of friends in White county.
