Below is a copy of the rule issued against the commissioners of each district.

GEORGIA, WHITE COUNTY.  
Board of Roads and Revenues White county. September term 1893.

To —, Commissioners of roads for the — Dist. G. M. and road district:—

Complaint having been made against you for a failure to discharge your duties as Commissioners.

You are hereby notified to show cause before said commissioners of Roads and Revenues for said county, at the October term next why you should not be fined the sum of fifty dollars for a failure to have your said roads in your district worked, measured, posted, according to law. In default of said showing you will each be fined.
