Affairs in France.

London, Dec. 7.—The Times has the following special from Paris, dated December 6th.

The French ministry tendered their resignations at this morning's council, and President MacMahon has accepted them.

Paris, Feb. 7.—It is believed that the new ministry will include M. Leon Say as minister of finance.

M. Dufaure has held a consultation with delegates from the left. It is rumored that difficult exists because President MacMahon persists in holding the portfolios of interior, war and marine ministry above from the influence of parliamentary duties.

The following semi-official note is published: The president having accepted the conditions on which M. Dufaure has agreed to form a new cabinet, he has, in his part, asked as his sole condition that the ministers of war, marine and foreign affairs should retain office.

On the War Path Again.

Dec. 6th, Dak. Dec. 3.—Many rumors are in circulation about Indian depredations on the northern route, but few can be traced to reliable sources.

On Saturday last six men reached Crook City suffering from exposure and want of food. They report that the cause of the Belle Fourche River, about forty miles from this city, was attacked by a band of more than two hundred Indians.

Their party kept the Indians at bay for some time, but were finally forced to abandon the camp, leaving their horses, mules and camp equipage, in addition to other property captured by the Indians during the fight. Three Indians were killed, but no whites were injured.

A report from another source states that a band of Indians visited Madden's ranch, on the same crossing of the Belle Fourche route and drove off all the stock.

A heavy ice was discovered last week leading across the Big Horn road. At the intersection of the trail and road the Indians had made a crude stockade of an Indian and a white man, terminating, surrounded by three stars.

A ranch on the Sidney road, six miles from Crook City, was attacked recently, but the people escaped into the woods. The Indians ransacked the house, destroyed all the property they could find.

The County Commissioners were informed by General Sheridan today, by telegraph, that General Crook has been ordered to afford relief to the freighters, and also to the settlement in the Black Hills.

From Mexico.

CITY OF MEXICO, Dec. 1.—Lerdo de Tejada withdraws his pretensions to the Mexican presidency and intends retiring to France. He recommends Gen. Escobedo to the suffrage of his friends. Various bodies of troops are moving to this frontier. The Rosecrans railway concession is supported by a majority of both houses of congress. It is believed the Oceanic company has one deposit of ten million dollars in England, and that Tom Scott is the leading spirit of the company, which is said has three million ready to commence operations.
