## First Annual Meeting OF MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL.

Marietta, January 14, 1879.  
The Hon. Joel T. Haley, mayor elect, and Messrs. A. S. Edmonston, H. Reid, A. B. Gilbert, T. L. Hunt, H. S. Anderson, and W. J. Hudson, aldermen elect, for the ensuing year, having been duly qualified, met this evening to transact such business as was necessary.

The mayor elect then addressed the board of aldermen as follows: "Gentlemen of the City Council—I congratulate you upon the fact that the church corrects all the characteristics of Socialism. The *Italian* newspaper regards the encyclical as an appeal to all Catholics to organize a crusade against modern institutions and with that object in view, to participate in political elections."

One other suggestion, gentlemen, before we proceed to the regular business of this session; and that is, the propriety of taking the necessary steps during your term of service to have the City of Council and the city marshal elected by the people, at the time and in the same manner that the mayor and aldermen are. We will now proceed to the regular business before you.

The Council then proceeded to affixing the salaries of officers, as follows: Mayor \$200, Clerk \$150, Marshal \$350, Deputy Marshal \$300, and Treasurer \$50 per annum, and City Surveyor \$3 per day when actually engaged.

The election of Clerk was then taken up, and Geo. M. Manning having received a majority, was declared elected. The election of Chief Marshal was also taken up, when Sanford Gorham, having received a majority, was declared elected chief marshal, and Wm. T. Banks deputy marshal. A. B. Gilbert was then elected city treasurer.

The treasurer, clerk, marshal and deputy marshal elect were then called and sworn in for the ensuing year.

The following were fixed for licenses for the present year: Bar-rooms \$150, Billiard tables \$30, Roulette tables \$150, Ten Pin alleys \$25, Two-horse drag \$20, One-horse drag \$10, all payable quarterly in advance; and for city auctioneer \$500 payable in advance.

The following committees were then appointed: On Printing and Clerk—Anderson and Edmonston.

On Streets and Sidewalks—Reid, Anderson and Gilbert.

On Finance—Hudson, Edmonston and Reid.

On Ordinances—Edmonston, Hudson and Hunt.

On Public Square and Country—Anderson, Hunt and Gilbert.

Council then adjourned until the first Monday in February, at 7 o'clock p. m. JOEL T. HALEY, Mayor.
