cases were reported to the board

of health this morning. No deaths

have occurred.—A detail of twenty

five men from a colored mili-

service. It has been raining

steadily since daylight. Dr.

Samuel Fox of Ennis, Texas,

arrived here this morning. He

will be sent out of the city to-

night by order of John Johnson,

superintendent of the quarantine

as he has never had fever and the

inspectors at the quarantine sta-

tion have been instructed not to

permit unacquainted people to

enter the city.

Ten additional cases were re-

ported to the board of health this

afternoon—six of them colored.

Two deaths from yellow fever

have occurred, one however be-

yond the city limits. The special

police men, engaged in taking

the census of the city completed the

list to day. The result shows the

population of Marietta to be 16,

110; namely, whites, 4,283; col-

ored, 11,827; adults, 10,651;
