It is said the affair all originated from a trifling matter, and is much regretted by the good people of the community.

PICNIC AT "SMITH'S PARK."

The universal verdict rendered by all who had the pleasure of attending the picnic and barbecue at Round Oak last Friday, Aug. 17th, is "it was the very best managed and most enjoyable social reunion ever held in Jones county." The crowd here estimated at, from 800 to 1000. The grove of five acres had reared under its welcome shade groups and circles of friends and it was difficult to put a fair estimate upon the numbers. The large crowd was altogether the most orderly we ever saw, while the managers of the mammoth pit and long table, conducted everything quietly and with the best of order. No more considerate host can be found than the "lord of the manor," Hon. R. J. Smith. He was everywhere and always in the right place, with a pleasant word at a kind act for all. Had we the descriptive pen of the sweet writer, Polson, how we could describe the beauties of Smith's Park! We would tell of the spring, the shade, the cool breezes which all the while played between the

hillsides and the glassy little stream where ever and anon a cunning barefoot boy would "slip into, just to paddle, but let us append the nice description from the Macon Telegraph, with an addenda of sincere thanks from the appreciative crowd to the excellent managers of the "Round Oak Picnic."

"Nature has done much to beautify the spot selected for the picnic, and also has been materially aided by Mr. R. J. Smith, Sam Barron, Joe Barron, H. J. Marshall, J. M. Hunt, the Messrs. White, and all other citizens living near the grounds. It is to be called "Smith's Park," as it is located on Mr. R. J. Smith's land. No better location on the Covington and Macon rail road can be found for Macon people to spend a day. A winding ravine, enclosed by bold bluffs and covered by a dense growth of young poplar, maple and oak, makes a cool retreat from the fiero rays of the sun.

At the head of the ravine is located a bold spring of cool, limpid water, which has recently been enclosed with big granite slabs, which will long stand as a monument to the enterprising people of Round Oak. The stream of water which flows from this spring winds its way through the ravine, passing under a natural bridge and making a beautiful cascade over some rocks. Most of the undergrowth had been cut and raked away, seats conveniently arranged, temporary bridges thrown across the stream, and a good platform erected for dancing. Soon after the crowd began to assemble, dancing began to the music of a band from Macon, and was kept up all day, the dancers only long enough to partake of the beautiful feast which had been spread for the crowd of 600 or 800 people. And such a dinner! It makes one's mouth water now to think of it. A walk around the pit which reared about twenty-five lambs and pigs on their beds of hickory poles, roasting and browning over the coals, would make a man "smell a mile," in the expressive language of one of the women.

Col. Frank Haschel presided over this part of the entertainment, and right royally did he do his part, as a very man, woman and child present can testify. The Colonel was no stranger to his surroundings, having attended a barbecue at this spring sixty years ago. To such "cue" as was served, and the richest chicken pie, fried chicken, ham and the many other good things that only the good women of Jones county can prepare, and you have some ideas what a dinner we had. If anybody did not get enough it was not the fault of the committee, for we heard the genial Jesse Hunt, in his jovial way, call upon everybody to come up and be filled, as there was enough for all and to spare. The arrangements for the picnic were most admirable and everything passed off without the least jar or friction."
