W. Sloum, chairman of the executive committee, who was made permanent chairman of the convention, and J. C. Barron was elected secretary. The new Democratic executive committee was selected, and fixed upon August 3rd for the nomination of a representative in the Legislature. The following are the delegates to the different conventions:

Congressional: J. W. Barron, R. V. Hardeman, R. C. Lester, R. H. Kingman, Dr. W. P. Glover, Dr. J. W. Anderson.

Gubernatorial: H. B. Ridley, J. R. Vanburen, Richard Johnson, R. T. Ross, J. A. Pitts, Dr. R. B. Barron.  
The following resolutions were read and unanimously adopted by the Democratic party of Jones County in public meeting assembled. 1st. Resolved that the principles set forth in the platform of the St. Louis Convention on the Tariff question, as also the principle for which all true Democrats are contending for under the Mills Bill now before Congress and the views of Pres. ### Letter from the Editress.

Talbot County, Ga.,  
July 23rd 1888.

After several weeks of antici-  
pation and preparation, we with the  
"better looking portion" of the fam-  
ily, wended our way to the little  
village of Gray, where after a  
patient (7) hours waiting, the "ac-  
commodation" pulled up to its stopping  
place, and baggage, box and baby,  
etc., placed in position, we were  
soon, as one baby remarked, "Going  
somewhere?"

At 2 o'clock p. m. we boarded the  
Columbus train, in Macon, and were  
surprised to see the crowd of pas-  
sengers for the season. It is always  
interesting to watch new faces,  
and among these we soon located  
the bright face of a recent Wesleyan  
graduate, who was going over to  
her brother's marriage in Columbus.  
A tired mother, with three dust be-  
gimed children from Savannah,  
vainly tried ever and anon with  
soap and towel to make the three  
respectable. Of course the irrespec-  
table Drummer was there, indeed,  
several of them, and every time the  
"little red pass book" was presented  
to the venerable Capt. Jeter, his  
face took on a deeper look of con-  
tempt and the already furrowed  
brow wrinkled more. A poor old  
man travelling with a quite nice  
looking daughter had been "painting  
the town red" and was just reach-  
ing the stage of "feeling mighty  
bad" as the coach rolled out the  
Depot. The daughter, with crimson-  
smeared cheeks, patiently endeavoring  
to hide her shame, made a picture  
fit for a Temperance pencil and a  
subject fit for the eloquent tongue  
of its orator.

All along the route the green

fields of waving corn and blooming  
cotton, with the sun's slanting rays  
lighting the scene, with now and  
then a flash through a bridge as it  
spanned a muddy creek, overburied  
by willow boughs and rank enjam-  
bled with brambles, was really enjoy-  
able. The crops seemed to be fine,  
cotton especially, and we never saw  
so many watermelon patches, some  
in acreage enough to be called fields  
while we passed carload after car-  
load of the luscious fruit, some enormous  
in size.

Since arriving in the old county  
of Talbot, we have been faring royally,  
from one elegant country home to  
another, where vegetables of every  
kind flanked always by the richest  
chicken pies, etc., makes the dinner  
hour a time to be anticipated.

One housekeeper tells me she has  
raised this year 350 chickens, sold  
73 dozen eggs and had quantities of  
butter milk and eggs for family use.

We are now sojourning in Bald-  
winville, so called from the family  
of that name, whose numerous sons  
and daughters have homes one mile  
apart in this neighborhood. There  
were in the family eight sons and  
four daughters, all are the young-  
est of these have large families and  
at every house we find a girl baby.  
This is leap year you remember.

Crops are the finest in Talbot,  
than for years. The Farmers Alliance  
has a much stronger force here  
than in Jones. It has a membership  
between eight and nine hundred,  
has established a store in Talbotton  
with \$12000.00 stock of goods and a  
capital of \$30,000.00. Only about  
175 men, including the lawyers,  
doctors and merchants, of the coun-  
ty, are not members.

We will go from here to Talbotton  
and will give some dots there in  
next weeks issue.
