DEMOCRATIC MEETING.

We, the undersigned, members of the democratic executive committee of Twigg county, assume this method of informing the delegates to senatorial convention from Jones and Wilkinson counties, that we were, and are now, in full accord with the views of those members of the committee, who met in Jeffersonville on the 10th day of July, and appointed the 10th day of July as the day for holding elections at the various precincts in the militia districts for senator of the twenty-first senatorial district. We also regret, that circumstances were such as to prevent our attendance, but we indorse fully the action of those present, and we do consider the "no called" and self-conducted committee, and its action in appointing the 20th day of July, as the day for holding an election null and void, but a well planned piece of political "jobbery" that should be condemned by all true democrats.

B. S. FITZPATRICK, LEONARD SKELTON. Twigg county democratic in mass meeting, held at the residence of W. E. Carwell was elected permanent chairman of the meeting and D. S. Faulk secretary. After the object of the meeting was explained, upon motion the chairman appointed a committee of five to draft a preamble and resolutions to be presented to the meeting. Said committee reported the following which was unanimously adopted: (We, the undersigned democratic citizens of Twigg county, believing in true democracy and democratic principles and usages as handed down by our forefathers, hereby proclaim that there is but one legally appointed democratic executive committee in Twigg county, and that said committee is the one organized on the 26th day of July last after a regular call for that purpose, and that we recognize the nomination of George Z. Glover as the democratic nominee of Twigg county, and will present him to the Gordon convention, which we hold at Gordon, Ga., on the first day of September next, and ask that his nomination be confirmed by that body as the senator of the twenty-first senatorial district. (The above had 101 names signed to it, but for want of space, we can not publish them in full.)

We, the organized democracy of Twigg county, this day assembled in mass meeting to take cognizance of the independent movement led by certain designing men and politicians, for personal and political purposes, in which they claim to be acting for the cause of harmony in the county. do Resolve (1), That our fight is not a personal character, neither is it for political preference, but for pure democracy in all that the term implies, and to rid the county of one man domination that has dictated the politics and named the officers of the county for the past ten or twenty years. Resolved (2), That harmony is a term not known to those opposing democratic organization in practice. Their policy has invariably been to array the strong districts of the county against the weaker for political and personal interests; therefore the document signed by the party opposing the regular democratic organization in Twigg county (there are a few exceptions in which innocent men were misled into signing the same) and published in the Southern and Appeal we denounce as a piece of political clap-trap gotten up to deceive the democrats of Jones and Wilkinson counties. Resolved (3), That we deplore the circumstance from the bottom of our hearts, which have carried a few of our best citizens who have always been acting with the democrats of the county in opposition to the democracy into the camps of their enemies; and we recommend to all true democrats of the county that however strong the claims of blood relationship, that they stand true and loyal to pure democracy, which in the past has saved our country, and must be its only hope for the future. Resolved (4), That we indorse and ratify the delegates to the Gordon Convention. (Continued on extra.)

CITIZENS MASS MEETING.

At a meeting of the citizens of Twigg county, which met after extended notice, and with a fair representation from every section of the county, Mr. S. W. Yopp was elected chairman, and J. C. Shannon secretary.

After stating what the object of the meeting was, the chair declared the meeting ready for business. Col. D. G. Hughes made an address which was conciliatory and patriotic.

The following resolutions were introduced by Mr. J. U. Barkett, which were unanimously adopted. Whereas there has been some confusion in our county, resulting from hasty actions of a few individuals and whereas we deeply deplore the fact that a few indifferent men, regardless of the welfare of the democracy of Twigg county insist

upon stirring up strife and dissension for purposes of overriding the will of the people of Twigg county. Therefore be it resolved by the people of Twigg county, in mass meeting assembled.

1st. That in the will of the people rests the sovereign power, that no true democrat can or will refuse to be governed by the time honored principles of the democratic party; the very essence of which is that the will of a majority is and should be the supreme law.

2nd. That we owe no allegiance to any man or any faction, but consider of the highest importance the welfare of the democratic party. And that we earnestly request all parties having real or imaginary wrongs to average, to lay aside personal feelings, and lend their united efforts toward the rebuilding and preservation of the democratic party of Twigg county.

3rd. That as there are claimed irregularities in the election of both of the executive committee in our county both claiming to have been regularly elected, now in the interest of peace and harmony, and for the purpose of bringing together in democratic unity, every element of the democratic party. We repudiate both of the said democratic executive committees and proceed to elect a new democratic executive committee to serve for the next ensuing two years, or until their successors are elected, conformably with the custom and usages of the democratic party.

4th. That as it is the very essence of every free form of government, that any executive power can also abolish. We have the indisputable right to take this action.

On motion of Mr. Wm. Faulk, the meeting proceeded to elect a new democratic executive committee for the county. On motion the chair appointed a committee of 5 to select and present to the meeting the names of suitable gentlemen to constitute a democratic executive committee for the county of Twigg to serve the ensuing two years or until their successors are duly elected.

The following gentlemen were appointed on said committee of five: Dr. J. R. Wimberly, Wm. Faulk, P. A. Johnston, A. F. Martin, and W. J. Harrison.

The committee made the following report which was voted on by district and unanimously adopted: Jeffersonville Dist. A. F. Martin, Higginsville, I. N. Maxwell, Shady Grove, W. B. Tarver, Bluff, J. R. Cook, Pearson, T. J. Robertson, Jeremiah Sanders, Hammock, E. F. Crossby, McDonauld, L. A. Nash, Ward's, H. S. Newby, Marion, Wm. Faulk.

Col. D. G. Hughes moved that the report of the committee, naming the executive committee, be received as a whole, which was carried unanimously.

Resolved, That the Macon Telegraph, the Jones County HEADLIGHT, and the Southern Appeal be requested to publish these proceedings in their columns. Meeting adjourned.

At a meeting of the citizens of Twigs county, which met after extended notice, and with a fair representation from every section of the county, Mr. S. W. Yopp was elected chairman, and J. C. Shannon secretary.

After stating what the object of the meeting was, the chair declared the meeting ready for business. Col. D. G. Hughes made an address which was conciliatory and patriotic.

The following resolutions were introduced by Mr. J. U. Burkett, which were unanimously adopted. Whereas there has been some confusion in our county, resulting from hasty actions of a few individuals and whereas we deeply deplore the fact that a few indiscreet men, regardless of the welfare of the democracy of Twigs county insist

upon stirring up strife and disunion for purposes of overriding the will of the people of Twigs county. Therefore be it resolved by the people of Twigs county, in mass meeting assembled.

1st. That in the will of the people rests the sovereign power, that no true democrat can or will refuse to be governed by the time honored principles of the democratic party; the very essence of which is that the will of a majority is and should be the supreme law.

2nd. That we owe no allegiance to any man or any faction, but consider of the highest importance the welfare of the democratic party. And that we do earnestly request all parties having real or imaginary wrongs to avoid, to lay aside personal feelings, and lend their united efforts toward the rebuilding and preservation of the democratic party of Twigs county.

3rd. That as there are claimed irregularities in the election of both of the executive committee in our county both claiming to have been regularly elected, now in the interest of peace and harmony, and for the purpose of bringing together in democratic unity, every element of the democratic party. We repudiate both of the said democratic executive committees and proceed to elect a new democratic executive committee to serve for the next ensuing two years, or until their successors are elected, conformably with the custom and usages of the democratic party.

4th. That as it is the very essence of every free form of government, that any creative power can also abolish. We have the indisputable right to take this action.

On motion of Mr. Wm. Faulk, the meeting proceeded to elect a new democratic executive committee for the county. On motion the chair appointed a committee of 5 to select and present to the meeting the names of suitable gentlemen to constitute a democratic executive committee for the county of Twigs to serve the ensuing two years or until their successors are duly elected.

The following gentlemen were appointed on said committee of five: Dr. J. R. Wimberly, Wm. Faulk, F. A. Johnston, A. F. Martin, and W. J. Harrison.

The committee made the following report which was voted on by district and unanimously adopted: Jeffersonville Dist. A. F. Martin, Higginsville, I. N. Maxwell, Shady Grove, J. C. Barnes, Taversoville, W. B. Tarver, Bluff, J. R. Cook, Pearson, T. J. Robertson, Jeremiah Sanders, Hancock, E. F. Crossley, McDonald, L. A. Nash, Ware's, H. S. Newby, Marion, Wm. Faulk.

Col. D. G. Hughes moved that the report of the committee, naming the executive committee, be received as a whole, which was carried unanimously.

Resolved, That the Macon Telegraph, the Jones County HEADLIGHT, and the Southern Appeal be requested to publish these proceedings in their columns. Meeting adjourned.
