Empire City--Georgia's 2nd Largest--A Dream?

Conjure up, if you can, a picture of a Cobb County of the 1970's governed by one authority. The cities of Marietta, Smyrna, Austell, Acworth, Powder Springs and Kennesaw would no longer exist. Neither would the Marietta Public School System and the present overlapping systems of water, sewerage, street and road maintenance, police and fire protection and taxation.

Imagine all the territory in Cobb County consolidated into one municipality called Empire City, the state's largest in area and second only to Atlanta in population.

For most of the county's estimated 150,000 residents, conjuring up such a vision will no doubt require a very potent dose of imagination.

But one Cobb Countyman, State Rep. Bob Howard of Marietta, has not only imagined this revolutionary turn of events but drawn up legislation for introduction in the General Assembly aimed at bringing it about.

There are at least two very formidable "ifs" that must be resolved if Empire City is ever to become more than a plan on paper. And Rep. Howard candidly admits that the odds against it wouldn't encourage many bets.

First all, the bill must be signed by five of the members of the Cobb legislative delegation before it can even be placed before the voters in November. Friday afternoon it had three signatures -- Howard's and those of Reps. Hugh Lee McDaniel and Bill Cooper.

Obtaining those two other signatures will require a "selling job" on Howard's part. Rep. Joe Mack Wilson has openly opposed the idea and Sen. Sam Hensley has drawn up legislation considered a rival. Sen. Cy Chapman and Rep. Jack Henderson reportedly are cool to the proposal.

If the bill should get the

necessary five signatures and signed by the governor, Howard then will have the task of selling his idea to Cobb County voters, who have a deep conservative streak likely to reject anything of such a far-reaching nature. But Howard is optimistic that the voters, if given a chance, will approve his Empire City plan.

The new city will be created by a series of actions. First of all, the charter of the City of Elizabeth will be amended to reincorporate it as Empire City, invested with all rights, privileges and powers available to municipalities under Georgia law.

The charters of the cities of Marietta, Smyrna, Austell,

Powder Springs, Acworth, Kennesaw, Machinery City and Chattahoochee Plantations will be repealed and Empire City will assume all the territory that now makes up Cobb County.

This new city will be governed by a mayor and an 11-member city council elected from nine wards. The consolidated city will assume all the assets, liabilities, and obligations of the currently existing municipalities.

The Marietta School System will be abolished and all its assets, obligations powers duties and responsibilities taken over by the Cobb County School System.

All water and light supplies

for Empire City will be administered by a Board of Lights and Waterworks, which will operate subject to approval of the mayor and council. It will have charge over any system of sewerage within the limits of the city and be authorized to purchase, establish, maintain and build a sewerage system in Empire City.

All zoning matters, including those now handled by the county, will be under jurisdiction of the city.

A municipal court, with a judge appointed by the mayor, will be established and granted all powers and authorities allowed under existing state laws.

Among its other powers, Empire City will be able to:

- Buy and sell real estate, electricity, and gas at cost or for a profit both within and without its territorial limits.
- Exercise complete control over public street, including the speed limits.
- Levy, assess, and collect taxes to raise sufficient revenue for all improvements, services, equipment and facilities.
- Tax ad valorem all property subject to taxation within the city.

Rep. Howard said the Cobb County government would not cease to exist, but would continue to carry out its role of See EMPIRE CITY Page 3

Marietta Pilot Finds Reason to Love Life

Most Vietnam War stories end sadly, but one Marietta's has a happy ending—at least, temporarily.

1st Lt. Alvin F. Pannell is in a U.S. Navy hospital at Beaufort, S.C. suffering from a fractured and dislocated right leg and hip, the loss of 12 teeth and severe facial lacerations, but he's thankful to be alive.

His light "spotter" plane, an O-1C Birdog, was shot down by Viet Cong in January 27 and, fortunately for Pannell, the crash was near more Marines who were able to pull him from the wreckage.

The lieutenant's parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. F. Pannell, of 383 Talcott Circle, first heard of their son's injuries February 4, when he called them from a Navy hospital at Yokohama, Japan. The next Friday, the senior Mr. Pannell was at a local barber shop and telling of his son's experience, when a man in the next chair, who was perusing a current issue of "Life" magazine, said "Well, here's his plane."

The picture the man showed Pannell was used in conjunction with a story about the battles at Khe Sanh, the place where, sure enough, Lt. Pannell's plane had been downed.

Other friends of the family called the Pannells over the weekend and mentioned the picture, so the Pannells took a copy of "Life" when they learned their son had been transferred to the South Carolina hospital.

Lt. Pannell took one look at

the magazine and said no, it wasn't his plane. Then he began to examine some other pictures he had that had been made of the wreckage and compared them with the one in the magazine and said "Well, maybe." And when he noticed an identification

mark on the plane that had been his, he was certain that it was "his plane pictured in 'Life.'"

The magazine story did not name the pilot, but had merely said a light spotter plane had been shot down and that the Marines were able to get the pilot out alive.

According to the lieutenant's parents, Pannell had been taking off facing the enemy-held hills when his light plane was hit by enemy mortar. He reportedly told his parents that he could prob-

ably have landed his plane without crashing, but his wheels caught on some barbed wire, causing the crash.

Mrs. Pannell said her son told her the engine was knocked back into the cockpit pinning him in the wreckage. She said the six Marines who performed the rescue forcibly pulled the pilot's seat back and away from the wreckage to free Pannell. A passenger riding in the back of the small plane escaped with only a few scratches, she said.

The "birdog" is used to fly over enemy territory and "spot" the enemy. The pilot keeps radio contact with nearby troops and reports the enemy's movements. Since the planes are in such danger, their light, sm-11 design is a protection. Mrs. Pannell said her son told her the day before his crash he had thought he was going to die. He said he had been dodging enemy fire that would have disintegrated his plane in mid-air, his mother said. She said her son told her he was normally not excited when reporting the enemy's locations, but that he had been weaving through the bombs and fairly screaming into the microphone.

A 1961 graduate of Marietta High School, Lt. Pannell attended Emory University 3 years before his enlistment in the Marines in October, 1964.

He was married in September, 1964, to the former Nancy Hassler, of Atlanta, and the couple has one child, seven-month-old Lisa.
