

COMMERCE OF SAVANNAH.

For the year ending 30th September, 1877, there were shipped from the Port of Savannah, two hundred and ninety thousand and seventy-three bales of Up-land and Lowland Cotton, valued at one hundred and eighty-five bales of Sea-Island, making two hundred and thirty-three and five hundred and fifty-eight thousand and four hundred and thirty-five bales of Rice, and five hundred and fifty hogheads of tobacco. The whole valued at the present prices, at four cents per pound, amounts to one hundred thousand dollars. To this may be added Lumber and other valuable articles exported, an estimate of which at the present prices, would amount to about that would really increase the amount of the year's exports. Contrasting the exports of the year 1836 and 1877, we find that the former year the Port of Savannah exported one hundred and eighty bales of Sea-Island and one hundred and eighty bales of Up-land Cotton, two thousand eight hundred and thirty bales of Rice, and three hundred and eighty hogheads of tobacco, worth of cotton this year would have been greater but for the losses of sea and land, and this and three hundred and thirty bales of Up-land Cotton, the quantity of rice arriving at our city.
