The Keystone rolling mill, which employed over 250 men before the Reading iron works failure, since which time has been idle, will resume work next Monday.

Mrs. Gladstone was presented by the Woman's Liberal Federation with a diamond brooch containing a miniature of Gladstone copied from Millers's portrait.

The republican state convention, to nominate a candidate for treasurer, to be elected next August, convened in Louisville yesterday. John Z. Barrett, of Louisville, was nominated.

Tuesday morning Mr. John H. Walker, of this county, recovered from a thornapple a half dozen young red foxes. He expects to keep them until they are full grown and start a menagerie.

The roof of the colliery at Merthyr Tydfil, Wales, has fallen in, killing one miner and entombing fifty eight others. Work is being actively prosecuted for the rescue of the imprisoned men.

Frank L. Loomis, Seward G. Loomis and Edwin S. Jewell, officers of the Century Book and Paper company, of Chicago, were yesterday indicted by the grand jury for conspiracy to defraud.

Mr. J. F. Gibbs of Cochran has a curiosity in a chicken with four well developed legs, or rather two pairs of legs, one pair at the place where other chickens have legs and another pair just back of those.

Minister Robert T. Lincoln arrived at Liverpool yesterday, on the steamer City of Paris, on his way to London. He was welcomed by the mayor of Liverpool, Mr. White, secretary of legation, and others.

Mr. J. R. Lee has in his possession a \$55 bill dated 1779. It is an old relic and has been in the possession of his wife's family for several generations. He refused an offer of \$130 a short time ago for the bill.

The Headlight, T. B. Penn: Publisher (Published by request) MONTICELLO OR MACHEN?

Editor T. B. Penn: In a recent issue of your daily I see a report of certain resolutions as passed by the directors of the O. M. & R. R. at their meeting on the 8th inst., and which were unanimously adopted, to-wit:

"Whereas, This company obtained an amendment to its charter authorizing the construction of a branch road from the town of Monticello to the city of Griffin, etc.; and whereas, it is not deemed expedient by this board at the present time to extend said branch road from the town of Monticello, it is therefore resolved, Two-thirds in number of this board concurring, That a branch road be constructed from a point at or near the town of Machen, on the line of said R. R. through or near the town of Jackson or some other point in the county of Butts, to a point on the Central R. R. at or near the city of Griffin, etc.; etc.; etc."

"Resolved, That this board believes it is to the interest of this company that a branch road be extended from the town of Machen aforesaid, to the town of Eatonton, in Putnam county etc.; etc."

These resolutions with one or two others, not necessary to insert here as signed by A. Craig Palmer, secretary, and as above stated were adopted unanimously. Shall we, the public, infer that these resolutions received the sanction of each and every director elected that day? Did each and every director deem it inexpedient to build this extension from Monticello to Griffin, and did deem it expedient to build said extension from Machen direct to Griffin? If so, why did they not give their reasons to the public. We, the minority stockholders, claim to have some right, and this we deem an important one to us to know why it is not deemed expedient to connect this extension with Monticello, and is deemed expedient to connect with Machen. We honestly assert that extension should be made at Machen; but we will undertake to give some plain, common sense and practical views why said extension should be from, or at some point near, Monticello.

1. Monticello is the natural point of connection, being on a direct line between Griffin and Eatonton, the termini of the proposed branches, whilst Machen is nine miles north of said line, the route via Monticello thereby being the shortest possible line.

2. The subscribers to stock of the Covington and Macon road in Monticello and vicinity have paid in more money to said company than any other point on the line, and I might venture, with truth, to say that every other point put together and they have paid dollar for dollar.

3. Many good citizens of Monticello have invested their money in new buildings, merchandise, real estate and divers other things, based upon the assurance given them by the authorities of this road, that they intended to make Monticello the most important point on the line; that these branches would be built from that point, and to give strength to this assurance they caused an amendment to be passed by the legislature to their charter asserting that the extension to Griffin should be from or near Monticello. Many of our citizens, therefore, having invested all of their available means will be very seriously damaged financially should the extension be made at Machen.

4. The building of the road from Machen will necessitate the building of an extra expensive bridge and about nine or ten miles of additional grading, together with fourteen miles of iron to put down. From Monticello via Minnetta to Winfree, the point where it is proposed to leave the grading of the Covington and Macon, is seven miles, three of which are complete and the cars running over it, and four graded with the iron to be put on.

5. Another common-sense reason is that the extension should take in the splendid water power a Smith's mill and the highly-famed

summer resort, Indian Spring. These places would be built up and would ere long furnish a large patronage to the road. These facts are worthy of consideration, and when calmly investigated I feel assured that they will conclude that it is expedient to build said extension from Monticello.

In your issue of May 18 your local gives what he supposes to be a protest from the citizens of Monticello and vicinity against the building of this branch road to Griffin via Minnetta. This line the citizens want. It is the extension from Machen directly across the county to Jackson, and which will carry off the trade of Monticello instead of building it up and as your interviewer states, will result in a "freeze out" game for Monticello. Your local has several other errors, and in fact has several things considerably mixed up which calculated to leave erroneous impression. The citizens of Monticello are indignant and justly so, and if the proposed line is built from Machen it will raise a "clamor" in that town and vicinity that the Covington and Macon road will never be able to down. We glory in the building up the county, the whole county. We love Col. Machen and the Covington and Macon road for what he has done and will do for the development of our resources, and we unhesitatingly accord to him our heartfelt gratitude, and solemnly protest against the unfounded and malicious rumor that we entertain other than the kindest and best feelings for him. We do scorn and detest any principle that would seek to build up individual and personal interest at the ruin of a whole community, and viewing this whole matter in the light of truth, justice and common sense, we do not believe that this board of directors, who are honorable men, will issue the order that will carry into execution the resolutions above stated.


