We have not read the Olive Bill. We understand however its object and purpose is to prevent monopoly and encourage competition. By the R. R. of the State. This step is in the right direction, and should receive the endorsement of the Legislature and people, even if it decreases the rental of the State road. If the purpose of the bill be consummated we can afford to lose the rental of the road, the compensation to the business men and farmers of the county will be an hundred fold.
