A BIG DEAL.

Water Works for Marietta at Once.

A WASTE FACTORY TO BE BUILT

In Connection with the Marietta Paper Manufacturing Company. This is Good News.

A very important deal was made last week by Mr. S. A. Anderson, proprietor of the Marietta Paper Manufacturing Co., who is one of the best business men in the country. He sold \$75,000 worth of stock in his two paper mills, one in town and in the country, to Dr. Lewes Sessions, of Union Springs, Ala., and Mr. M. M. Sessions, of this place. Mr. Anderson retains \$75,000 worth of stock. Dr. Sessions is a very wealthy gentleman and is President of the Marietta Trust and Banking Company. He has also bought Mr. M. M. Sessions' new home and will move here as soon as he can get possession. Mr. M. M. Sessions is a well known attorney of this place and has also proved himself a successful business man. We learn that these enterprising gentlemen will at once put in a good system of water works to supply their mill with abundance of water and also the town. They will ask for a franchise from the city and a charter will be granted next month at the sitting of Cobb Superior Court. It is thought that inside of three months water will be turned on in Marietta. Noonday creek, four or five

waste from cotton factories and convert it into rope, and that part of the waste not suitable for rope-making, will be made into paper, utilizing everything. The combined enterprises will give work to a large number of hands and prove a great benefit to the town.

The papers have been signed and the trade closed, and the survey for the water works has been commenced.
