## THREE TAILORS.

Street tailors of the Union Point, Ga. are Samuel J. Richardson, Charles A. Duns, and Henry G. Walsh. These three tailors are well known and their work is of the highest quality. They are located in the Union Point, Ga. building.

Following is a description of the weather at Union Point, Ga. on Friday, July 12, 1890. The weather was very hot and the sun was very bright. The temperature was 85 degrees in the shade and 95 degrees in the sun. The wind was from the south at 5 miles per hour. The sky was clear and blue.

In 1890 the month of June and May were in many respects the counterparts of the same months of 1889. There was more rain in May and less in June, perhaps; but the thermometrical characteristics were similar. On the 10th of July, 1889, warm fires were built in parlors and bedrooms as far south as the northern boundary of Florida, and for at least two days the atmosphere was strikingly cool, particularly in prolonged intervals while the sun was absent. In that year and during the month named these thermometrical antics were of common repetition. The same has been true in 1890. On Saturday night, July 6—last Saturday—at midnight it grew suddenly so cold after midnight in August that the writer rose from his bed in quest of additional covering. The day and the early night had been uncomfortable warm and conserving, and the morning of the 7th (Sunday) was again normally warm.

We believe these sudden atmospheric phenomena are due to the conjunction of electrical earth currents with sensitive elements in the upper ether; and we believe they may recur without commotion or danger, according to the nature of their release from one body to the other. But if a great volume of electrical matter in the earth shall be drawn into violent conjunction with another considerable volume of electricity in the atmosphere—or vice versa—then a severe earthquake and loss of equilibrium will ensue at the altitude of contact. That point cannot, of course, be determined in advance.
