

Last Will and Testament of Henry Sapp
Georgia Bibb County

In the name of God Amen.

I Henry Sapp of the County and State aforesaid considering the uncertainty of the mortal life and being of sound and perfect mind and memory, bless the almighty God for the same, do make and publish the my last will and Testament in manner and form following: that is to say.

First: I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Bernellasant Sapp in the event that she should survive me, to her own use and benefit during her natural life all my Estate both real and personal all goods and chattels of whatever kind and nature, whomever to enjoy the same in her own right during her natural life, and after her death to be further disposed of in manner and form following.

Second: I give and bequeath unto Henry Spear, Archibald Spear, Bernellasant Heiter, Martha McKim, Eliza Powell and Patience Barries to be held and enjoyed by them after the decease of my wife if she should survive me or if not at my death all my Estate both real and personal that is to say lands, stock, goods, chattels and every manner of property or effects which may or of right belong me not heretofore disposed of, and I herein recommend that there should be an equal distribution between the above named legates.

Third: I give and bequeath unto my present negro male slave Lebaner now about thirty five years of age, his freedom after he shall have arrived at the age of fifty years. I herein appoint my gransons Henry Spear and Archibald Spear Executors of my last will and Testament, hereby revoking all former wills, by me made.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal this twenty sixth day of October A.D. Eighteen hundred and twenty nine.
