

Will of Jeremiah Wilson

Brooks County { In the name of God, Amen. I Jeremiah
Wilson of the aforesaid State and County, being
in perfect health, and of sound mind and
memory, and calling mind the uncertainty of life
and that it is appointed for all men to die and
having a desire to bequeath my estate in a way
that it may not make dissention among my heirs
do hereby make and appoint this my last will
and Testament hereby revoking and disannulling
every will at any time heretofore at any time made
by me

Item 1st I commit my spirit to God, who gave it, and my
body to the earth, from whence it was taken, to be
buried by my friends in a decent Christian burial
not in the least doubting, but I shall receive the
same again at the general Resurrection.

Item 2nd I wish all my just debts paid. If at the time of my decease
I should owe any and the remains of my property consist-
ing of the land whereon I now reside, namely eastern
division of lot No. 431 situate in the 12th District of
aforesaid County together with stock of every kind
consisting of horses cattle and hogs to my beloved
wife Eliza Wilson and also my house hold kitchen
furniture, plantation tools, corn fodder potatoes and
bees for her use while she may live.

Item 3rd And after the decease of said Eliza to be equally
divided between my three daughters, Eliza Ann
McLeod wife of Minard McLeod, Mary Ann
wife of Ephraim T. Brown and Sarah Ellen
wife of Berry J. Tolson and as to my other three
children, Jeremiah Wilson Jr. Margaret Louisa
Burnett wife of James H. Burnett and Emily Jane
wife of A. B. Brown, I consider I have given to each
in lands horses &c. so much as I have and
to leave to the three to whom I have given, and
I hope each of them will be happy, blessed
while I am blessed, and I have for the
the sake of peace and of
Testament this is all that I have given to
my children and I have
legitimate heirs of my estate
