Georgia, Item first, I desire and direct that all my
Butts County, Just debts be paid without delay.
Item Second, I give and devise to my beloved wife
Martha Allison, one lot of land number fifty
nine in the ninth district originally Henry City
now Butts County, containing 100 hundred two and
a half acres, it being lot on which I now live
on, with all the rights, members and appurtenances
to said lot of land in any wise appertaining or
belonging, free from all charge, with one cotton gin
one thrasher one fan and one screw to pack cotton
to her own proper use benefit and behoof forever
with full power to dispose of the same after the Chil-
-dren is raised, to her own use.

I also give and bequeath to my wife in the same
unreserved manner what farming utensils she
needs, one horse her chose of my horses, one cow and calf,
one heffer, one sow and pigs, six shotes, five sheep to
be of her own choice out of my stock, one beasted one
bed and clothing of her own choice, cooking utensils
that is pots, ovens, tracs, pigens, sifter the quantity she
thinks necessary, one bearers, one folding table, one brass
clock, one looking glass, one dining table, one cupboard,
one chest, one set of drawers, one set of bras hand irons,
one set of smoothing irons, one dressing table, one set
of plates, one set of knives and forks, one set of table
spoons, one set of Tea spoons, 100 dishes, one set of cups and
sawcers, one set of Candelis Mocks, one loom, one spinning
wheel, of her own choice, one pair of Cotton Cards, emta
barrels one pickling tub, one thousand pounds of pork,

Twentyfive barrels of corn, too thousand of fodder, one coffee mill, ten bushels of wheat, one cester, Slays of her own choice, I also give and bequeath, my wife Martha, in the same unreserved manner my negro woman named Baster, about twenty seven years old, also her child, Emanuel, about ten months old, also one man about seventy five years old, to her one us forever.

Item third. I devise to my son Thomas Jefferson Allison, my negro boy Georg, about ten years old, worth fore hundred dollars, to him and his heirs forever.

Item fourth. I give and bequeath to my son Robert W. Allison ten dollars to him and his heirs forever.

Item fifth. I give and bequeath, to my Daughter Amanda M. F. Falkner, wife of Zachariah Falkner, and to her children, free from the disposition of the present or any future husband, ten dollars to her and hers forever.

Item sixth. I give and bequeath to my son William Allison my negro boy wat about nine years old and a girl Genna eleven years old worth seven hundred dollars, also one lot of land in doola County the thirteenth district, number too hundred and thirty, to him and his heirs forever.

Item seventh. I give and bequeath to my daughter Marthew Allison, my negro girl Ann, eleven years old, also one boy Calif, five years old worth seven hundred dollars, to her and her heirs forever.

Item eighth. I give and bequeath to my daughter Mary Frances Allison, my negro girl Mary Ann, eleven years old and a boy Green three years old, worth six hundred dollars, to her and her heirs forever.

Item ninth. I give and bequeath to my daughter Demarious Allison, my negro girl Jane, a boy Luis three years old, worth five hundred dollars, to her and her heirs forever.

Item tenth. I give and bequeath to my son David Ephraim Allison my negro girl Betsey, seven years old, frank a boy six years old, worth six hundred dollars, to him and his heirs forever.

Item Eleventh. I give and bequeath, to my daughter Eliza Gwynn Allison, my negro girl ^{three hundred dollars} Luder, ^{years old}, one girl child of wims not named, the one younger than Green both worth three hundred dollars to her and her heirs forever.

Wat in place of the one not named

Item Twelfth. My Carriage and waggon I leave for the use of my family. The balance of my property real and personally, I leave my Green negro to work the plantation to board and cloth and school my children when anny one of my children marries or becomes of age tha have to get a horse saddle and bridle one bedsted bed and bed clothing, one cow and calf, one sow and pigs, one set of Chears Common, one Spinning wheel, one pot, one oven, two piggons, a bread Tray one sifter, one pair of cards, one set of plates, one set of cups and saucers, to dishes, one set of table spoons, one set tea spoons, one set of knives and forks, the boy one plow and saw gears, Clevish and Swingletree. If ana one of my children dies before marriage or becoming of age, thear part is to return with the balance left on the plantation, and if Anna one of thear negroes dies before the receive thear part, it is to be fild with one of them that is left not wild, at its value, when received when all my children is Green or married tha have to be made all equal, with the one that has got the most, with the exception of my son David Ephram Allison that is when all becomes of age he is to get lot number fifty eight farm lay Henery now Butts County to him and to his one use, and to his heirs forever. If my wife marraes before the children becoms of age, the property is to be sold, that is the perishable property, and the negroes is to be hired to board and cloth and school my children and if she Sars single the are to all sta on the plantation as before named. I constitute and apoint my beloved wife Martha Allison Executrix and my son Robert W. Allison, Executor to this my last will and Testament. —
