

Lash Will and Testament of 1794

Thomas
 Carlell Emory } & Heirs of the said Thomas of the State & County
 of Georgia (being informed with a sense of the uncertainty of
 life and the probability arising from any advanced age
 and somewhat impaired health that I may soon be called
 away from earth and being now of sound mind and disposing
 sense and desirous of settling what appears to me to be an
 equitable and proper disposition of my worldly effects do
 therefore do hereby declare and certify this my last Will and Testament
 and first I desire to record my grateful acknowledgments to
 the Author of our being for the comfortable share of this world
 goods He has been pleased to bestow upon me, and for the
 many years He has afforded my life to enjoy them,
 and in making a disposition of the property I may die
 possessed of I desire and direct, first that all my just
 debts be paid with as little delay as possible and I
 do give and bequeath to my beloved wife Mary Anne
 Carlell the use of all my remaining estate both
 real and personal during her natural life enjoining
 it upon her to use the same for the promotion of her
 own comfort & happiness and in such deeds of charity
 as she may find it her duty to dispense; giving her full
 power and authority to sell or exchange any portion
 of said property either at public or private sale and
 with the proceeds to purchase other property or to invest
 it in any way for the benefit of herself and children
 or to pay divide the proceeds equally among my children
 I hereby except from the above bequest the packages
 of realty in my possession signed by Geo. Heard
 George Matthews & Co. Matthews were payable to me
 at different times in the future & calling for
 one hundred and ten dollars, and one note on
 Mandeville & East for seven hundred & twelve dollars
 & also payable to Eugene among my Grand Son said
 package of realty on the proceeds thereof to be
 delivered to him or his heirs or assigns thereof to be
 settlement of my estate as his & mine thereof, and
 on the death of my wife I hereby direct that what
 remains of my estate shall be equally
 divided among my living children or the children of
 any who may die in the interim and I hereby
 appoint my wife Mary Anne Mandeville
 the executrix of this my last Will and
 Testament with full power to select and
 appoint an assistant to act her in carrying
 out the provisions of this same in testimony
