 I, Saffron Caroline Stillwell of the County of Carroll and State of Georgia, being of sound and disposing mind and memory, and being desirous to settle my worldly affairs, while I have strength to do so, do make here publish this my last will and testament.
 And first I bequeath my soul to God who gave it, and my worldly estate I dispose of as follows.
 I, Saffron Caroline Stillwell, sister of James M. Stillwell of the County of Carroll State of Georgia, do by this my last will and testament in writing, dispose of my estate as follows.

All my household goods also my lifeless and my part of the land of the estate of Dr. H. Stillwell.
 I, Saffron Caroline Stillwell do hereby bequeath the above named property to James M. Stillwell.
 The witnesses whereof I the said Saffron Caroline Stillwell to this my Will consisting of the foregoing has at last of paper have set my hand and seal this month 21st 1893.

Autographic Will of M. R. Spennell Deceased,
 State of Georgia } This is to certify that we the undersigned
 Carroll County } Inquest were called in on the 8th day
 Jan 23rd 1893. } of March 1893 to write and witness
 the last will and testament of
 M. R. Spennell now deceased, and the following is a true
 and correct statement of how he wished his estate
 disposed of.

State of Georgia Carroll County.
 In the name of God Amen.
 I, M. R. Spennell being of sound and disposing mind and memory, but knowing that I am appointed for some time to die, I declare this my last will and testament.

1st I will and desire that my body be decently buried in
a Christian like manner.

2nd In disposing of my estate, first of all, I will most
desire that both my just debts be paid.

3rd I will and desire that my beloved wife Francis F. Spennell
have five hundred dollars, three beds and bed clothes
and the sewing machine that she and Cornelia Robinson
brought here. Also I will and desire she have a year
support for the purpose of her maintenance and
comfort during her natural life.

4th In disposing of my estate I will most desire that
each of my children have an equal portion of my estate.

5th I further will and desire that the two boys John B. &
Clarence C. Spennell shall have a good estate or the
equivalent, as I gave the wives of my children,
and then all my estate both real and personal
be sold by my executor to the highest bidder and
the proceeds be equally divided amongst all my
children.

6th As I hold notes against several of my children,
I will and desire that they come as a part of their
distribution share of my estate.

Seven after the Spensing of these words, viz about
twenty five associates which reside in D. Spennell died.
