Mind, here by make and ordain
this my last will, Testament
that is to say first of all I
commend my Soul into the
hands of Jesus Christ my only
hope and Saviour and my Body
to decent burial at the discretion
of my Executors not doubting
the resurrection of the same at
the last Day and as touching
worldly Goods where with God
has blessed me in this life I
give and dispose of the same
in the following manner

That is, first my wife is to have
all my just debts and personal
charges be paid out of my
estate then I give and
bequeath to my two grand-
daughters Martha Miller &
Maria Miller twenty
pounds sterling each to be
paid twelve months after
my decease then my will is
that the remainder residue
of my estate be equally divided
among my seven children
vizt my beloved Sons James
Miller Samuel Miller and
Daniel Miller and my
beloved daughters Elizabeth
Clark Edith Miller Mary
Miller, Harriet Miller
the Negro Sench Mary Ann

which I formerly gave to my
Sampson & Elizabeth Clarke -
being included as a part of her
share which I gave to them
their heirs and assigns forever
I do hereby constitute appoint
and ordain my trusty friend
Parmenter May esq and my
sons Samuel Miller and
Daniel Miller executors to
this my last Will Testament
and do hereby wholly disallow
all former wills or Testaments
by me made and do ordain
constitute this to be my last
Will Testament In Witness whereof
I have hereunto set my hand
and this done by virtue of
November 18th 1800 in the
Town of Danvers New

J. Bonville Barrister at Law, Esq.

one of the subscribing Witnesses
to the above and within
written last Will, Testament

oath that he was present

and that he was of sound and
disposing mind and memory
to the best of his knowledge
believing that he with the same
was by him and his wife their
names as witnesses at the
request and in the presence of
the said Notary and in each

time James W. Esquire
one of the barristers at law in
the said city of London was
summoned and had the 8th
February 1774 J. W. Esq.
