I Andrew Robertson, of Savannah finding myself in strong health of Mind tho' much reduced in body, by my late sickness, and moreover being bound to Liverpool, in a late season; make the following arrangements of my affairs previous to my departure from Savannah viz.

In case of death I resign my soul to the almighty, (from whence it comes), in hopes of its being revived through the intercession of our most blessed saviour, my body to be put out as quick as possible.

I, by this deed appoint James Johnston, and James Robertson of the city of Savannah, Merchants, my Executors to see this my last will put in force.

After paying all my just debts and collecting what is due me and to the next given them, it is my most earnest wish that they would attend to what follows.

To James Johnston I leave my watch, the being a valuable one. To Susan B. Robertson my God daughter in Charleston I leave one hundred and fifty Pounds Sterling.

It is my request that my cloths, Books, Charts, & indeed every articles I personally have on board the ship, on her return, be sold, as it was my intention, to have married Ann Roche, daughter of Wm Roche sen: but I wish to return to this place; I leave her the whole of what I am possessed of (after the aforesaid arrangement having been made) excepting what is left to Susan B. Robertson & James Johnston Junior in case the above Ann Roche marrying, this Property is to be secured to her in such a manner as it can not in any way be made over, but is intended entirely for her use to dress & take children: should she die before marriage it is to revert to Alexander and Daniel Robertson.

It is my most earnest and last wish that J^r Robertson & J^r Johnston Junior will attend, assist and advise Ann Roche in all cases and endeavor to make her life as happy as possible.

Bey this my last will I empower J^r Robertson & J^r Johnston, each of my sons to see the above executed signed in the presence of John Jones and Matthew Johnston, this 29th day of November in the year of our Lord 1800. Andrew Robertson O

In the name of God Amen. I Barbara Council
of the city of Savannah widow being of sound mind but sick and unable
in body to make this my last will and testament in manner and form
following first my soul I recommend to God my maker, my body I desire
to be buried in a decent christian ^{like} manner at the discretion of my executors
herein after named.

I give to Sally Mitchell five hundred dollars to be paid to her on the day of her
marriage or coming of age say twenty one years old and the interest thereof
to be paid her annually after my death for her support, also one feather
bed and the furniture thereto belonging.

The rest and residue of my estate I give devise and bequeath unto my
Brother John or Johanna Stobell now in Europe, his heirs and assigns real
and personal, but I direct and order that M^{rs} Elizabeth Stobell be
permitted by my Executors to come live in my house where I now reside
and keep the things therein of furniture kind untill my brother arrives and
order what shall be done therewith, and the liquors I now have on hand
I give to Elizabeth Stobell she to take Sally Mitchell to live with her
as she did with me, and no change to be made against M^{rs} Stobell
