I now have containing forty nine acres of Land lying near the head of
Wilmington in the county and state aforesaid she making no widow there
and after her death to descend to her son Lewis holding together with

and I am fifty
days I give and bequeath unto my dear Friend Whiting the sum before
mentioned of all the money and other chattels etc of which I shall die
I suffer from, a sum of one hundred dollars to be paid to my brother John
Turner by my mother year after year for during life
and after the death of my sister Elizabeth Whiting all the estate which I am
grateful to be equally divided among my said sisters then surviving children,
together with the income of said property
till the rest of my worldly goods whatsoever, and whenever after the
~~death~~ of my said sister I give, devise and bequeath unto James Lucy et
Lewis Turner Whiting as mine alone, to be equally divided among them
and if either of the said children should die without issue, the share
of their portion to be equally divided between the two surviving ones and in
case they all should die without issue, then in that case all their shares
to be equally divided among my Brother Richard Turner's children whom
shee alioe may. Lewis who is to have my acre above the rest tract
of Land on which I now live
Lastly I heartily recommend my Brother Richard Turner my brother John
Turner and my friend Solomon short executors of this my last will and
