late of the County of Kent in the State of Georgia and
now residing in the City of Savannah being near
the body but of sound Mind and Memory and aware
of the Importance of Life and the Certainty of Death
Do Make this my last Will and Testament hereby
Revoking all other so former Will or Testaments
Made by me for me or in my Name
First I Give my body to the Earth from whence it
came to be recently buried by my Executors herein
I shall herein after Name and I recommend my
Soul to the Care of Almighty God who give it
Secondly, It is my will that all my just debts shall
be paid out of any part of my Estate that my Executors
shall think proper to appropriate for the best advantage
of the same And that my Funeral Charges be immedi-
ately paid after my Death

Thirdly and lastly I Give and bequeath all the
Real and personal of my Estate both real &
personal to Owen Hughes & the City of Savannah
And do by these presents Recommend and appoint
Them the said Owen Hughes my sole Executors
By testimony whereof I have put my hand and
fixed my seal at Savannah the second day of May
in the Year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred
and five and in the twenty ninth Year of the Independence
of the United States of America

Paper writing dated 2^d Aug 1816, from writing to John
 and Mrs. Fildes, who had been at Hooking since the
 war and during the time of those distressing times.
 Papered was found in the usual form on September
 1st 1816. It is found in the form of a letter
 to the L. Fildes, 1816. It appears that about
 1816 in the City of London, having been
 the establishment of the paper writing in

St. Charles 30. Money for Captain Roberts who
purchased a letter paper containing \$2000 in 1850
1853; also purchasing later. He lost the money
but receiving that the paper was 1/2 for a
New Brunswick. He also received the balance
of the stock of the Court of Admiralty that James
Crawford, Captain of the late 1850s, a money
applicant from the occasion of the Court of
Admiralty.
