Be it known to all that it may concern that I, Obadiak M. Feay of the State and Parish aforesaid being of sound and perfect mind & memory tho weak in body knowing the instability of all human affairs, have thus thought my duty to make this my last will and testament. I hereby declaring against all of an earlier date - first then, I hereby request the divine Author of my existence to dispose of me as his judgment & mercy may deem fit fully believing that whatever may be, his decrees are just and as to the few worldly matters which has been intrusted to my care I make this distinct declaration that after all my just debts are paid, that I leave my son William, sole heir of all my effects of every shape whatever except such articles as shall be hereafter named. with regard to the household furniture, I with my dear wife Esther Feay to retain all that originally hers before our marriage and all that I

possessed before that period I wish to go to my son
 William, and all small matters of the household kind
 I wish equally divided between my son and wife. I also
 leave to my wife the horse & gig that I am now pos-
 sessed of, and it is my further wish also that she
 shall receive the entire profits arising from the labors
 of her negroes for the last year. and I do further de-
 clare that I leave my brother Launcelot H. Feay &
 Henry McAlpin sole executors and do most strictly
 enjoin them to see this my last will and testament
 faithfully executed and that they shall be sole guard-
 ians of my son until he arrives to the age of twenty
 years. In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my
 hand this eighteenth day of January in the year
 of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifteen.
