

In the name of the most High God Father,  
son & Holy Spirit. amen. —

I Tho: F. Williams late merchant of the City of  
Savannah, being of sound & disposing mind & memory  
do make & ordain this my last will & Testament.

Imprimis. I commit my soul to God & my body to the  
dust in full & certain hope of the resurrection. —

Secondly. I desire that all my just debts may be  
paid as soon after my decease as possible.

3<sup>d</sup>. I give and bequeath to the State of Georgia  
my native State, two thousand Dollars in Georgia  
Audited certificates of their nominal value, as  
expressed in the body of said certificates. — I further  
give them my advice to pay all their just debts  
because righteousness exalteth a nation but sin is  
the disgrace of any people.

3<sup>d</sup>. I give to Miss Hannah Hilly five hundred Dollars.  
4<sup>th</sup>. I give to Mrs. Mary Stackhouse five hundred  
Dollars.

5<sup>th</sup>. I give to Chatham Co. Wills, Book G, 1808-1847  
www.georgiapioneers.com Capt. Ebenezer Williams one thousand &  
fifty Dollars, to be paid to him, deducting therefrom  
abt. four hundred Dollars, due by me to his  
late fathers estate, which sum he will credit  
that estate, as received from me in full.

6<sup>th</sup>. I acquit Mrs. Thomas Hilly of a Balance due  
me on acct.

7<sup>th</sup>. I give & bequeath to Miss Jane C. Clancy the  
daughter of my Mothers brother one thousand Dollars.

8<sup>th</sup>. I give to Mary Ann Clancy James sister, the  
stock of Cattle, purchased at the sale of William  
Butlers estate & now in the care of Edw<sup>d</sup> Bonquet.

9<sup>th</sup>. Whereas, the Judgt<sup>s</sup> in the Fed. Court in fa-  
vor of Richard Dennis against Stephen F. Williams  
has become mine by settlement with Rich<sup>d</sup> Dennis.

I desire all the property belonging to said Williams  
may be secured to him under that Judgement dur-  
ing his life and at his death I give & bequeath  
the same to his children Mary Ann Clancy  
& Stephen F. Williams than whom I have no other

10th. I give and bequeath to my brother Stephen S. Williams, my proportion of the negroes now in possession of Capt. Marbury: & which after Mrs. Marbury's decease belong to the estate of my deceased father.

11th. I further give & bequeath to my brother Stephen S. Williams during his life one half of the Duck Yard on condition that he continue the establishment for the joint benefit of himself and my estate.

12th. I give and bequeath to my wife Sarah Williams one hundred volumes of my books - all my house hold and kitchen furniture including beds &c. also my carriage & one fourth part of all my remaining estate of every kind.

13th. I give and bequeath to my son Ebenezer Hill Williams & my daughter Hannah Locke Williams all my remaining estate to be equally divided between them. But in the event of my leaving other children besides these two, then to my desire the remaining three quarters of my estate to be equally divided among the children which may survive me.

Thos. F. Williams.

14th. Whereas there still remains a house on the Filature Lot, a tract of land on Crooked River, and about ten thousand dollars in Georgia audited certificates besides some uncollected debts, undivided between Rich<sup>d</sup>. Dennis & myself and these are liable for the payment of certain demands for which they will be more than sufficient. It is my desire that any sum which may belong to me after the payment of the debts of Dennis & Williams be employed in manner following. I give and bequeath the said amount be it more or less, in trust to my heirs after named executors to be put out at interest upon good security, and at the end of twelve and an half years - the principal and interest to be paid to the first incorporated body for the establishment of an Infirmary within the State of Georgia for the relief and protection of afflicted and aged Africans and should

Such an institution may be founded within the period named  
then I desire the said sums be again put at interest until  
such a necessary & benevolent institution shall arise.

15th. I leave all my manuscripts to the care of my friend  
George D. Sweet and if he can select from among them  
any worth printing, I request him to arrange them for  
that end, and my desire is that the profits arising from  
their publication be also employed for the relief &  
protection of afflicted & aged Africans in the same  
manner as the bequest in the preceding article

16th. I appoint my Brother Richard F. Williams and my  
son Ebenezer F. Williams when he shall reach his eight-  
eenth year, (which will be on the fifteenth of February  
eighteen hundred & thirty one) executors of this my last  
will & testament, and I authorize my brother to sell  
for the best prices he can the negroes purchased  
by me from the estate of Butler, together with the  
plantation Woodville, so as to enable him to pay  
my debts & legacies & especially to secure at interest  
the amount of my debts & legacies belonging to the children  
of William Butler, whom I have committed to his special care.  
My desire is that the  
remainder of my estate be kept together for the  
benefit of my wife & children. I desire my children  
may be well educated. My son Ebenezer I wish taught  
the Hebrew Language and history of the Jewish  
Nation, as, should it please God to convert him  
I should wish him to employ his time, talents  
& talents in benefiting the descendants of Abraham  
to whom I am persuaded God has designs of rich  
mercy. In the event of my wifes marrying  
again, the proportion of my estate left her wife  
separately be separated from that of my children.  
I recommend her having it secured to her for  
years to her marriage. It is my wish that  
the with our children in some healthy part of  
United States & if practicable, near a Seminary
