Be it Remembered That I Thomas
Mendenhall of the City of Savannah in the
State of Georgia, being of sound disposing
mind and memory do make this my Last
Will and Testament in manner and form
following. I Will that my funeral Charges &
Just debts be paid as soon as may be after
my decease. I Will that all my Household
Furniture of every description and all other
Property of whatever kind I may die possessed
of may be sold as soon as Circumstances
will admit; Excepting Fanny & Trim, and
one of the best negroes to be selected from
those at the Plantation, which said three
Negroes I give to my sons Thomas & John and
my Daughter Sarah who are to decide a
Choice by Lot; My Will is that Two Thousand
red dollars be paid to my Sister Hannah
Pastorius should she be living at the time of my
decease, should she be dead this sum to be
paid to her daughter Sarah Ann Pastorius
it being the amount of a Legacy & Interest
thereon left by my Mother to my said Sister
and Whereas I have given to my son John
at sundry times the amount of Fifty
red Dollars and I have given to my son
John Two thousand dollars to use
in Business, together with the sum
last seven hundred Dollars,

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Given my daughter Sarah One Negroe Wench that
Cost Two Hundred and Twenty Five dollars;
and to my son in Law Henry Hall her Husband
Two thousand Dollars since the marriage of my
Daughter Sarah with him; My Will is that
each of my said children be charged with the
aforesaid sum and each of them the said Thomas
John & Henry Hall do receive such a propor-
tion from the proceeds of my Estate as will
with what they have already received, put
them all on a footing of equality share & sha-
re alike and I do hereby constitute and appoint
my sons Thomas & John Mendenhall and my
son in Law Henry Hall to be executors to this
Will; hereby revoking all other Wills by me
heretofore made In witness whereof I
have hereunto set my Hand and Seal this
third day of March in the Year of our Lord
One thousand Eight Hundred and eight

Thomas Young of Chatham County in the State of
Georgia in North America esquire do make and
declare this to be and contain my Last Will and
Testament in manner and form following that
is to say First I direct that no superfluous or
unnecessary expence attend my funeral I Give
to the Poor of the Parish of Dalmeny near Queens
Ferry in that part of Great Britain Called Scotland
the sum of one Hundred Pounds Sterling and also
to the Poor of the Parish of the said Place Called
Queens Ferry the like sum of one Hundred Pounds
Sterling which two Legacies are to be paid as soon
as Conveniently may be after my decease into the
hands of such person and persons as may be at
that period the officiating Minister and Elders of
the said two places respectively in he by them
generally applied in such way as will seem best
Calculated to answer my Intention. I Give to
the Union Society of Savannah one Hundred
Pounds Sterling. I Give to Ann Mason
Sarah Patton the two daughters of my much
esteemed Uncle the Reverend Mr. James Patton
deceased and
Partane the two Daughters of the
deceased the other of the daughters of
the Sum of Five Hundred Pounds
be divided between them in the following
that is to say One equal share

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
