After the payment of my debts, I give to my-
selves Elizabeth Burke and Catherine Odell. The Negro and
set number her Regulators owned on which I am to have
my beds furniture and plates my two negro women her
and Betty with any children they may have. The
Eleven Shares I have in the State Bank and three in the
Planters Bank Half to one and half to the other. But
in consequence of the marriage of my niece Catherine Burke
It is my desire that her brother Thomas Burke hold her
properties in Trust for her paying her the Rent and divi-
dends of the same as they become due. If she has Chil-
dren that survive her then it is to go to them. If they die
before coming of age then the property to go to my niece Mary
Ann Cooper also my niece Elizabeth Burke half to go to
my niece Mary Ann Cooper if Elizabeth Burke die with-
out children. I leave to my Nephew William M. Queen

One thousand Dollars

To my niece Elizabeth Duff Smith I leave the fol-
lowing Negroes. A man and her children Richard Coffee
Abraham and Emily and her future issue and the female
London and Carl Cook

It is my desire that my servant Diana have
her free time and that my executors will use the best
means to secure it to her her children to be sold which
will go to pay the legacy to my nephew William M. Queen
but I request they may have the liberty of choosing their mas-
ter. After the payment of the above bequests I leave
the rest of my negroes to be equally divided between my
niece Mary Ann Cooper Margaret M. Queen and
Eliza Mackay and the children of my niece Sarah
McQueen

I leave my brother Archibald Smith my ex-
ecutors to this my last will and testament. Signed -
