that I shall see reason or purpose of inheritance and where-
ever to be found, unto my dear and well beloved wife Sarah
Rapp for and during her natural life and after her death to my
dear share and have child and to their heirs and assigns for
ever. But if it should please God that my dear wife should die
without issue then it is my will that my said wife and portion
at what he lives or united out to the best advantage and out
of the first moneys received that four hundred dollars be paid
to my brother William who is my wife's sister namely Elizabeth
Rapp of monies in token of my own regard for her to hold to her heirs
and the remainder of the said other estate to be appropriated and
applied towards the maintenance and support of my brother Wil-
liam Rapp and Elizabeth Rapp's children while they are unmarried and
unmarried, but as soon as the last of such children shall be one of
age or married. It is my will and I do hereby give that all my
said property real or personal of what nature or kind soever shall
descend to me and every of such my said Brother William may
be here alive to be equally divided amongst them share and share
alike to hold to them severally and respectively and to their heirs
and assigns forever. And lastly I do hereby nominate constitute and
appoint my dear and loving wife Sarah Rapp to be my executor
and my dear and trusty friend James Rapp to be my executor
of this my last will, hereby giving and granting to my said executor
and executors all my full power and lawful authority to execute the
my will according to the true intent and meaning thereof. In
witness whereof I do here both and sole execute set my hand and
seal at Savannah the twenty fifth day of May in the year of our
lord one thousand eight hundred and fifteen and of American
Independence the thirty ninth
