I give, devise and bequeath to my dear daughter Elizabeth Tamm Pin Bellard, I give, devise and bequeath to my dear daughter Nancy Jane all my household and Kitchen Furnishings. It is my Will and desire that the whole of the property herein before devised to my daughter Nancy Jane shall continue and remain with my dear wife Susan Tamm and that she have the use thereof during her life, provided and on condition that she continued to bear my name and remain my Widow, But should she marry then my Will is that this devise in her favor shall void and be void. All the rest and residue of my property Real and personal and of Whation distinction I fully give, devise and bequeath to my said daughter Nancy Jane to her and her Heirs, Executors, administrators and assigns forever, And I do hereby appoint my dear wife the Executrix and my friend James C. McPherson the Executor of this my last Will and Testament Witness my hand and Seal this Twenty Eighth day of June, One thousand Eight hundred and Twenty Five
