

State of Georgia - In the Name of God Amen! I, John W. Green of the
City of Savannah being of sound mind and disposing mind and memory do make
and publish my last Will and Testament.

First I give devise and bequeath the one half part of all my Estate real &c.
personal of what ever Nature or Kind, except a Negro Girl named Susan
into William Harrison, Son of my Niece Mary C. Parker, to be
delivered to him on his arrival at the age of Twenty one years, To hold
there he has and Assigns.

Second - I give devise and bequeath the remaining half of my Estate
real &c. personal, and also the said Negro Girl named Susan and
her future issue unto my Executors hereafter named to Take hold
for the Sole and Separate use of W^m Mary Green Bartholmew Wife of
W^m John Bartholmew come her heirs for ever.

Third - It was my desire to emancipate my Negro Slave Peter but as
this is forbidden by the Law of the State I leave it to my Executor to
make such Sale or disposition of him as will please him or nearly
in a State of Freedom as can be done without violating the Laws in
this regard.

Fourth - I constitute and appoint my friend Mrs. Cleland Executor
of this my Will and hereby authorise and empower her by her seal -
in Writing Whosoever I have hereunto set my hand and Seal this
Twenty second day of June Eighteen hundred and thirty
