

Charlottesville Virginia Sept 16th 1834.

In the name of God Amen, I Michael Cunningham
of Savannah, do hereby being sick of body but sound of
mind, and memory do make this my last will and
testament, in the manner and form following, Viz:
I give devise and bequeath unto my lawful children
Michael Cunningham and John Cunningham, all
and every my lawful property, Estate Goods Chattels
&c, with this exception that the articles of plate in
possession, bequeath for my daughter Ann, and my
Watch (Silver) bequeath for the use of my son Michael,
and I further do appoint Mr John Elmore and
Michael Brown August of Savannah my executors to carry this
my Will and Testament, into Execution, all other
previous wills and testaments being null and void.

In Witness hereof I the said, Mich^l Cunningham
have hereunto set my name and Seal, this sixteenth
day of September, in the Year of our Lord one Thou-
sand Eight hundred and thirty four, 1834.
