Recorded the 26th Nov. 1844.

In the name of God, Amen. I, Michael, Doolittle, widow of the
City of Savannah, in the State of Georgia, being mindful of
my mortality, do make and publish this my last Will and
Testament in manner following, I revoke and annul all
other wills and Testaments, heretofore made by me. I give
to Charles Foster House Esq., of the State of Virginia, my
negro woman Hannah and Molly - with the view that if they
or either of them shall desire it they or either of them may
acquit Seba, and the auspices of the Colonization Society.
If they do not desire to leave the United States, I have
entire confidence in the said Charles Foster Master, making
the necessary arrangements, for the freedom of both the said
Hannah and Molly, so that they may never be the slaves
of any person after my death. To my Sonnet woman, Mar-
nah, my Executors will pay one hundred dollars and
also apply from my estate twenty Dollars to buy for the
said Hannah and her daughter Molly each a suit of mourning.
To my nephew James Henry Johnston, now in New Jersey,
I direct my Executors to apply to his Education and main-
-tenance one hundred Dollars per annum until he is twenty
one years of age. He is now ten years of age.

Jan. 1840. Eighteen hundred and thirty three when he is twenty
 years of age or thereabouts he will before he arrives at that age
 the allowance of ten hundred dollars per annum for maintenance and
 of age, I direct my Executors to pay ten to him. For the maintenance and
 the said sum of ten hundred dollars to be paid when he shall
 demand it and without interest. The residue I direct arising from
 the residue of my estate, of whatever it shall be should be what the whole
 real & personal I give to my daughter Mary Johnston Wagon, the
 wife of James M. Wagon, of Savannah, Georgia, and at her death to
 be paid to my grand children, Henry Campbell Wagon, and
 Mary Campbell Wagon, children of the said Mary Johnston
 and personal estate can be divided between them. And upon the
 death of their mother I declare the said Henry Campbell Wagon,
 and Mary Campbell Wagon, to be the heirs of all my estate, whether
 a real or personal. In the event however of either of my grand
 children, Henry Campbell Wagon or Mary Campbell Wagon,
 dying without lawful heirs, then the residue I direct to be
 the heirs of all my estate, both real and personal. But in the
 event of the death of both, my said grand children, Henry
 Campbell Wagon, without lawful issue, then my said
 both real and personal I give and bequeath to my daughter Mary
 Johnston Wagon, to be paid her heirs forever.

I hereby appoint James M. Wagon, the sole executor of this
 my last Will and Testament.
