State of Georgia, do hereby certify that the within and foregoing, containing and being a declaration of my last will and testament, (truly writing & amending all former wills by me at any time heretofore made) in manner and form following, that is to say:

It is my will and desire that all my just debts and expenses of my last sickness and funeral be paid as soon as possible after my decease. And it is my further will and desire, and I hereby give devise bequeath unto my beloved wife Sarah (Christy) all my real and personal estate of whatever nature, now in possession or which may hereafter come into my possession or to which I may hereafter be entitled either in law or in equity, either as heir or legatee, giving the same to her for and during the term of her natural life, and at her death to Benjamin Constantine Wagner, son of John Wagner, to him his heirs forever. And I do hereby will nominate and appoint John Wagner of this State, executor of this my last will and testament. In Witness Whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and seal at Savannah this twenty fourth day of February, Eighteen hundred & forty one, George Washington

 all the contents of my Chest of Drawers, Dressing Room
 which is as well in my Paris house as in the apartment
