State of Georgia - Do make this my last Will & Testament
I direct that my just debts and funeral expenses be
paid by my executors, out of the first money that may
come to their hands.

I give and bequeath the sum of One thousand dollars

I do give and bequeath all my portion of my personal property and merchandise
in the "Bank of the State of Georgia" and in the "Underwriters
of the City of Georgia" unto my Grand Daughters the children
of my son George H. May now residing in the State of Maryland
to be equally divided between them; and in case of the
death of either without issue then the whole to the survivor;
and in case of the death of either with issue left, then the
portion of such deceased friend shall, I give to her surviving
child or children share and share alike; and I hereby
direct my Executors to sell so much of said Books and
amount to the aforesaid issue.

I do likewise give and bequeath my negro slave named Hammah who has been
faithful to me, and who is old, infirm and incapable of labor.
I do hereby give and bequeath the said slave Hammah
to Edward Taufville, Theodosius Burton and Francis S.
Burton now of the City of Savannah and State of Georgia,
and I do also give and bequeath the remainder of my
goods and chattels and all my worldly Estate whatever,
as aforesaid it may consist, unto the aforesaid Edward
Taufville, Theodosius Burton and Francis S. Burton,
in Trust to put the same at interest and to apply the
said interest wholly to the support and maintenance
of said Hammah, if she should survive me, for and
during the term of her life, in such manner as shall
seem most proper and fit to them and at the death
of said Hammah further in trust to pay to the "Methodist
and Wesleyan of Christ Church" Community the sum of
three hundred dollars, from the principal so that at interest
and to the "Society for the relief of Bridget Widows in
Savannah" the sum of two hundred dollars, or if the
principal should be more or less than the sum of two
hundred dollars, then to pay Hammah to the said trustees
before described in the same proportion of three to two,
whatsoever may be the amount so left.

If my negro slave Hammah should not survive
me then I give the whole of my estate whatsoever after
the payment of the one thousand dollars before named
unto the aforesaid Edward Taufville, Theodosius Burton
and Francis S. Burton in Trust to pay the same
unto the aforesaid trustees, to wit "The Methodists and

testimony of blind Claude in his capacity as a Notary Public for the taking of Testament, I do now, in the hope above before leaving immediately on my return,
hereby appoint and constitute the aforementioned
Matthew, Edmund Burton and Francis C. Burton of the
City of Savannah Executors of this my last Will and
Testament and desire them etc to act.

I now release a negro slave named Hammah who has been

I do hereby give and bequeath the said slave Hammah
to Edward Telfville, Theodosius Bartow and Francis S.
Bartow now of the City of Savannah and State of Georgia;
and I do also give and bequeath the remainder of my
goods and chattels and all my worldly estate whatever,
as aforesaid it may consist, unto the aforesaid Edward
Telfville, Theodosius Bartow and Francis S. Bartow;
in trust to put the same at interest and to apply the
said interest wholly to the support and maintenance
of the said Hammah, if she should survive me, for and
during the term of her life, in such manner as shall
seem most proper and fit to them and at the death
of said Hammah, further in trust to pay to the "Wardens
and Vestrymen of Christ Church" Community the sum of
two hundred dollars, from the principal so put at interest
and to the "Society for the relief of Bridgewater Widows in
Savannah." The sum of two hundred dollars, or if the said
principal should be more or less than the sum of two
hundred dollars, then to pay the same to the said Societies
before described in the same proportion of three to two,
whatever may be the amount so left.

If my negro slave Hammah should not survive
me then I give the whole of my estate whatsoever after
the payment of the two hundred dollars before named
into the aforesaid Edward Telfville, Theodosius Bartow
and Francis S. Bartow in trust to pay the same
unto the aforesaid Societies, to wit "the Wardens and

testimony of third church in Savannah, and to give
for the relief of Indigent Widows in Savannah, in the
proportion before leaving immediately on my return.

I hereby appoint and constitute the aforesaid James
Scupps, Edmund Melton and Francis C. Bartow of the
city of Savannah, Executors of this my last Will and
Testament and desire them etc to act.
