I give, devise and bequeath all my Estate both real and personal in possession and in action unto my wife, Leocadie Legriel her heirs and assigns forever, and I do hereby nominate, constitute and appoint my said wife the sole executrix to this my last Will and Testament.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal this twelfth day of April in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred & thirty six.
