in accordance by way of Will that you settle my  
affairs in the best way you can and as soon as you can  
for the advantage of my estate and my heirs.

For my heirs I leave yourself to take one quarter,  
my son Charles A Mitchell One quarter, my Brother  
Octavius Mitchell One quarter and my brother Melvin  
Mitchell One quarter of all my estate. (See body your  
Peter Mitchell)

Taylor of the City of Savannah in the State of Georgia, aged about  
forty five years and disposing mind make my last Will and Testament in  
the manner following, that is to say, in

(The) first place I do declare that all my just debts be paid

as far off as I might as may be convenient, and it is necessary to sell any part of my stock or property; I do desire and beseech my executors and trustees to sell a part of my stock in the Steam Boat Company as may be sufficient for the purpose, or to sell any lot or the City of Savannah known by the number 15, light in Water Street, with the improvements and apply the proceeds to the payment thereof. I would prefer the former method saving the trouble, but leave it to the discretion of my executors and trustees which mode to adopt, and the sale may be called in private or at public auction.

Second. I give devise and bequeath unto my beloved wife, Clayton Taylor for and during the term of her natural life, one third part of the rents, issues and profits of all my estate real and personal, with the privilege during her term of remitting in her use and enjoyment of the dwelling house and premises, in Liberty Ward, now in my possession by myself and her, free from rent or any other charge, and also in her use and enjoyment, without charge, of all the furniture, plate, bed and table linen, glass and crockery ware and other articles in use about dwelling.

Third. I give, devise and bequeath all that my said dwelling house in Liberty Ward, with the appurtenance, the lot on which it stands and the lot adjoining, with the furniture aforesaid and carriage & horses, after the enjoyment of the same by my said wife during her life, unto my friends Norman Wallace, Anthony Porter and William W. Gordon (three and to hold to them their heirs, executors, administrators and assigns and to their executors and assigns than his or their executors, administrators and assigns, for trust being for the sole and separate use benefit and behoof of my daughter Elizabeth, now the wife of Robert Higginson, in the same manner as if she were sole & unmarried, and not to be liable to the debts, contracts, directions or management of her present or any future husband, for and during the term of her natural life, and prior and after her decease, how to and for such other children of my said daughter as may belong at the death his or their heirs and assigns,

Hours and share alike, if near Hawkesbury

It is my Will and I declare and direct that my  
body be buried near the West of Bull Run Road  
annually and adjoining Fairview Street to the West.  
commonly called Taylor's Mound shall not be divided  
or sold out of the family before the year 1840 and not  
even then if the parties in interest can agree to keep  
it in the family.

I give, devise and bequeath unto my friends George B. Canning, Andrew C. Miller and Andrew J. Gillen, the sum of Augusta, their heirs and assigns, & to the survivors and survivor of them their or his executors ad-

ipues and profits of all my estate real and personal  
during the life of my said wife, and at and after the  
death of my said wife, one equal half part of all  
my estate real and personal of whatsoever nature  
in this case and except my dwelling House and  
lots furniture &c already herein disposed of, to have  
and to hold such third of the profits and such half of  
my estate in trust for the use and benefit and behoof of  
my daughter in law Julia Taylor (widow) of my second  
son Alexander and his heirs & William Taylor and  
Alexander Taylor in equal portions than heirs and  
assigns, the said half of my estate to be divided  
when the youngest of her sons shall arrive at the age of  
twenty one years.

I give devised and bequeath unto my said friends  
Matthew Wallace, Anthony Parker and William W.  
Gordon their heirs and aforesaid to the survivor and  
Survivor of them and the Executor, Administrator & his  
fieal Survivor - one third part of the rents, issues and  
profits of all my estate real and personal, during the  
life of my said wife and at and after the death of  
my said wife - one equal half part of all my estate  
real and personal of about seven hundred acres (land)  
and except my dwelling house and late furniture,  
already herein disposed of for her benefit of my  
daughter Elizabeth and intended by me to be in  
addition to the rights under this devise) to have and

(to) such thing of her property and realty left of my  
estate, by law to and for the sole and exclusive  
benefit and legacy of my said daughter Elizabeth Ann  
the wife of Robert W. Godwin in the same manner  
if she were sole and unmarried and not to be liable to  
the debt and/or direction or management of her  
husband or any other husband, for and during the term  
of her natural life; and from and after her decease  
then to and for such child or children of my said  
daughter Elizabeth Ann, as may be living at such time  
as her or their lives and assigns, share and characterize  
if more than one, provided however that if at the death  
~~of my wife Elizabeth Ann Godwin~~ there be living any  
issue of a deceased child of hers, such issue shall  
stand in the place of such deceased child and take  
accordingly.

Seventy fifth I order and direct that my stock of Wine be sold in  
the course of one year after my death, and the proceeds  
applied to the payment of my debts.

Eighty sixth I give and bequeath unto Mrs. Elizabeth W. Cheek  
the sum of Two hundred dollars to be paid at the  
end of two years after my death.

Ninety seventh I give my Gold Watch to my Grand Son William,  
son of my son Alexander.

Ninety eighth I constitute and appoint my wife Mary Taylor  
and my friends Norman Wallace, Anthony Porter George  
Plumming, William W. Jordan, Andrew T. Miller and  
Andrew J. Miller of Augusta executors of this my last  
Will and Testament, hereby revoking all former Wills  
by me made.
