I James Potter of the County of Chatham in the State of Georgia, being of sound and disposing mind, do make, publish
and declare this to be my last Will and Testament.

- 1 First. It is my Will and I hereby order and direct that all my
just debts and funeral expenses be duly paid and satisfied as soon
as conveniently can be after my decease.
- 2 Second. I give devise and bequeath unto my only Son John Ham-
ilton Potter my dwelling House in Princeton with all the furniture
plate and every thing contained therein together with all my mes-
sages lands and tenements with the appurtenances situate in
the County of Mercer in the State of New Jersey to him his heirs
and assigns forever - or if my said son shall so elect I give and
bequeath to him absolutely the sum of Twenty five thousand
dollars in lieu and stead of the said dwelling furniture, plate
& lands and tenements in New Jersey.
- 3 Third. I give and bequeath unto my respected friend Elizabeth
Mary Gillbow the sum of Five Thousand Dollars.
- 4 Fourth. I give and bequeath unto the Widow and two Sisters
of the late Robert L Stewart of Charleston the sum of Six Thou-
sand dollars.
- 5 Fifth. I give and bequeath to my Cousin Caroline Tully wife
of Benjamin Tully of Charleston the sum of Five thousand
dollars.
- 6 Sixth. I give and bequeath unto my Cousin Henrietta Gardner
of 5 Bath Place Porto Bello Scotland the sum of Two thousand
dollars.
- 7 Seventh. I give and bequeath unto my Cousin Mary Hazzards

Wife of Col. W. W. Hazard of St. Simons the sum of Two thousand dollars.

- 9 Ninth. I give and bequeath unto my Cousins Mary and Catherine Burdell of Charleston Grand daughters of my Aunt Martha Milson born Martha Tuller the sum of Four thousand dollars
- 10 Tenth. I give and bequeath unto my nephew James Potter D.D. of Princeton New Jersey the sum of Two thousand dollars—
- 11 Eleventh. I give and bequeath unto my Grand nephew John P. Stockton Son of John P. Stockton and Sarah his wife the sum of Two thousand dollars.
- 12 Twelfth. I give and bequeath unto my niece Mary Stockton daughter of R. F. Stockton Jr. the sum of Two thousand dollars.
- 13 Thirteenth. I give and bequeath unto my Nephew James Potter Colburn Son of J. H. & Jane Colburn of Charleston the sum of Two thousand dollars
- 14 Fourteenth. I give and bequeath unto my friend Mary C. Spriggell of Philadelphia the sum of Two thousand dollars
- 15 Fifteenth. I give and bequeath unto my friend Lucretia L. George of Savannah the sum of Two thousand dollars
- 16 Sixteenth. I give and bequeath unto my friend William P. Hunter his two notes and interest for Five thousand dollars
- 17 Seventeenth. I give and bequeath unto the Wardens & Vestrymen of the Episcopal Church in Savannah called Christ Church and their successors forever— towards a House as a Rectory for the Rector— the sum of Five thousand dollars.
- 18 Eighteenth. I give and bequeath unto the Rector Wardens and Vestry of Trinity Church Princeton New Jersey and their successors to be added to permanent fund the sum of Five thousand dollars.
- 19 Nineteenth. I give to the Union Society for the education of Poor Boys Savannah the sum of One thousand dollars.
- 20 Twentieth. I give and bequeath unto the Widows Society Savannah the sum of One thousand dollars
- 21 Twenty first. I give and bequeath unto Martha, Lydia & Virginia Hunter daughters of the late Timothy A. Hunter the sum of Five thousand dollars.
- 22 Twenty Second. I give and bequeath unto the Savannah Female Asylum the sum of One thousand dollars—
- 23 Twenty third. And as to all the rest residue and remainder of my Estate and property real and personal wherever it may be situated and of whatsoever it may consist my will is and I do hereby order and direct that it be fairly divided into seven equal parts or shares— and I do hereby give and devise one of the said equal parts or shares to my son John Hamilton Potter his Heirs & Assigns forever.

And I do hereby give and devise one other of the said equal parts or shares unto my Brother in law Robert F. Stockton my Nephew Richard Stockton and my friend Dr. William H. Bayler and the Survivors and Survivors of them their and his Executors Administrators and Assigns in Trust to pay and

delivers the income and proceeds thereof unto my son in law John D Langhorne during the term of his natural life and from and after his death to convey assign and deliver the whole principal to my four Grand children the children of my late deceased daughter Mary Marshall Langhorne or the survivors or survivor of them his her or their heirs and assigns. In case all my said Grand children, the children of my said daughter Mary shall die without leaving lawful issue the whole principal of this share upon the death of the said John D Langhorne is to go to and I give devise and bequeath the same to my then surviving children forever. And the remaining five equal parts or shares I hereby give and devise unto the said Robert H Stockton Richard Stockton and William H Cuyler and the survivors and survivor of them their and his Executors Administrators and assigns forever. In Trust nevertheless and for the sole and separate use, notwithstanding coverture, of my five daughters respectively to wit Catherine Elizabeth Wife of Philip Donblain - Sarah Jones Wife of Richard C Conover - Maria Stockton Wife of Charles H Higginson - Emily Chapl. the Wife of Richard M Cuyler and Frances Glen Potter - the income of one of the said shares to be paid by said Trustees to each of my said daughters yearly and every year during their natural lives; and upon the death of my said daughter or any of them the principal of their respective shares to be equally divided among their children or if they should die without leaving lawful issue among their surviving brother and sisters; but in case any of my said daughters should die leaving a husband surviving to her my will is that the income of her share should be paid by said Trustees to such surviving husband during his natural life and the principal of such share not distributed until after his death.

Lastly I hereby constitute and appoint my sons in law to wit Philip Donblain John D Langhorne Richard C Conover Charles H Higginson and Richard M Cuyler Executors of this my last Will and Testament.
