I give devise and bequeath unto my beloved wife Mary Ann all my property both real and personal interest and whatever it may be, to her own proper use benefit and behoof forever with full power to dispose of the same at any time before or at her death as she may think proper.

Item fourth

I constitute and appoint my worthy friend Benjamin Fisher, Executor of this my last Will and Testament.

In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal at Savannah this fifth day of December One thousand eight hundred and forty three.

I give and bequeath to my Executors herein after named, in trust for my sister-in-law Claudia Young, two shares of the Capital stock of the Marine and Fire Insurance Bank of the State of Georgia; also One Share of the Capital stock of the Central Rail Road and Banking Company of Georgia; and One Share of the Capital stock of the Savannah Gas Light Company.
