The receipts for the Year arising from decided interests on bonds - for U.S. Seamen, British Seamen, annual subscriptions and voluntary contributions amount to \$17,193.57

There are outstanding accounts for January which may amount to ten or twelve dollars - viz, Butchers bill, Baker bill & sundry others - after paying which - the balance on hand will be about \$2,400 to begin the Year with and of that amount, I think \$1,500 may be invested in such stocks as the board or the board may suggest, unless the present board shall be superseded by a new board which seems to be desired by some disaffected parties, who have come forward & contributed five dollars each to the funds of the Hospital with a view to increase its usefulness, to improve its management, and they are thereby members of the Corporation. The present board have carried on the affairs of the Institution harmoniously and prosper, that any change coming from parties dissatisfied with our management, & implying censure will not be in accordance with my wishes. If the change is sought & succeeds, be to wound the feelings of any member of the board by removing him, then I shall be greatly grieved. We must admit that according to the act of incorporation all freeborn (white of course) who shall contribute annually five dollars, to the funds of the Corporation, will be members of the Corporation, and for one, I shall be glad if the number shall amount to hundreds, provided they shall keep up the spirit annually, and not fall off on accomplishing the removal of the present board.

Previous to the secession of Georgia we had a contract with the U.S. Government for the care of sick & disabled seamen. And after secession, we continued to receive them on farms of John B. ...

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The collector of the port, with the understanding that he had no means of paying for them and that if admitted, we must trust to the justice of the U.S. Government, after the war, until 17th May, when the port was blockaded. - I have the bills of lading for Decr 1860, Jan'y Feb'y March & May 1861 amounting to \$3571.76 -

Mr. Boston was desirous of paying the Decr & Jan'y bill while he had in his hands in hand, but could not get permission from the Secretary of the Treasury to do so. The funds in his hands were soon transferred to the Confederate Treasury and we had nothing to depend on but the justice of the U.S. Government at a future day, when the war should be ended.

Having recovered these accounts after they had been secreted with other papers, & thought to be destroyed in the general wreck when Sherman's army took possession of Savannah, I prepared an account and presented it to the Secretary of the Treasury in June last accompanied by a respectful letter to the Secretary, to which, nor to another month later I received no reply. - I was unwilling to let the claim remain in that neglected condition, and as Mr. Johnston, one of your board, was then in the north, I requested him to visit Washington and endeavor to resurrect my letter and account. - In this he succeeded, and was told, that it could not be paid, unless by a special act of Congress. - I visited Washington City myself, twice on the same business, in the months of Decr & Nov. last & on my way to & from New York, and while I was courteously treated by all, I was told

by the Secretary of the Treasury, that the only way I could get the claim would be by a special act of Congress, and which I failed to believe could easily be had, through a representative from Georgia. - And on my return home, I prepared a memorial to Congress, setting forth the claim, and entrusted it to Mr. Nelson Jeff, who writes me, that he presented it to the Committee of Commerce, where I fear it will remain neglected & forgotten. - The claim may in time be recognized. -

A meeting of the managers elect, of the Gen. P. H. Hospital was held this day at the office of Dr. Duncan Johnson present

Col. Knapp was called to the chair & J. H. Johnston was appointed secretary. The report of the election as recorded in the book or a list sent, was laid before the managers and the same certified by ^{the managers} ~~the board~~ resulting in the election of seven Managers, viz W. Duncan R. Darnold, Charles Green, N. B. Knapp, J. J. Kelly, & J. H. Johnston. The same was received.

The meeting then proceeded to the election of a president, when W. Duncan was unanimously elected. Mr. Knapp laid before the board now organized, a letter from Dr. L. Waring in relation to the medical direction of the Hospital, which was read, and on motion made & seconded, the same was laid on the table.

The president laid before the board a communication from E. C. Anderson & others (copy of same on the foregoing page) which was read, as also the answer thereto which was approved.

The president presented to the board a communication which he sent to the medical body in his own & individual capacity, asking them to make any suggestions for the better management of the medical department of the Hospital saying that any suggestions they might make would be presented to the managers, & that no doubt the same would be respectfully considered. He said that no response had been made.

The president was authorized to have inside blinds placed in the windows on the South side of the Hospital up stairs. N. B.

Knapp & Charles Green were appointed visiting Committee for February & March.

The board then adjourned to meet at the call of the president.

Savannah Feb 16. 1869

A meeting of the board of managers was held this day at the office of the president

present W. Duncan J. H. Johnston Charles Green N. B. Knapp R. Darnold J. W. Nevitt & J. H. Johnston. The minutes of previous meeting were read & confirmed. The president announced that the first business in order was the election of attending physicians. Several plans were suggested for the medical department of the Hospital. After discussion the following resolution was offered by Mr. Green, seconded by Dr. Arnold, and unanimously adopted.

Resolved that the following arrangement be adopted, in reference to the medical department, at the Hospital, viz that there shall be for this year three attending physicians - one for the medical department, one for the surgical department, & one for the female ward, as follows for the medical department, from 1st March next till 1st November, for the surgical department one for the same time & for the succeeding months of Nov. Dec. Jan & February. The professor of practice of medicine ^{of the Univ. of Georgia} shall be the attending physician for the same months.

and for the surgical department, the professors of surgery shall be the attending physicians, & for the female ward the professor of obstetrics shall be the attending physician for the same four months with the privilege in each department for giving clinical lectures by said professors - new appointments may be made to each from the 1st March 1871 - the same to be governed by the experience of the working the present year. In the event of the vacancy occurring in either of the appointments the president with the visiting committee shall have power to fill the same.

The same was unanimously adopted.

D^r Arnold moved that D^r Haber-shaw be elected attending physician of the medical department & D^r Chulston for the surgical department, to serve from March 1st 1869 till Nov 1st 1869 - and that D^r J. M. Johnston be elected for the female ward for the same time - and the same was adopted. - Letters from D^r Haber-shaw & D^r Johnston tendering their services having been presented to the board and also a verbal tender of same from D^r Chulston.

On motion D^r Duveca was elected to the position he held last year as chief Superintendent.

Mr George Hollocks asked the privilege of his son being allowed to practice to the Hospital & assist the apothecary with the patients which was granted.

The president asked advice as to investment of \$1500 alluded to at the annual meeting, when after discussing various securities, bonds, stocks, &c the

same was left to the president to act according to his judgment - the general impression seeming to favor S. W. R. Road Stock.

The board then adjourned

Sarannah Feb 27 1869

A meeting of the board was held then day at the call of the president - present W. Duveca, R. D. Arnold, Chas Green, W. S. Knapp, J. M. Johnston & J. W. Norritt. The president laid before the board a communication from a Committee of the Medical College, expressing the views of the faculty with regard to the medical service of the Hospital.

The board proceeded to act on the several suggestions in that communication, and after some modifications the following were adopted.

1st - To establish in the Hospital the offices of Senior & Junior Pupils or Interns - the same to be filled by graduates or under graduates of the Savannah Medical College or other respectable college, each of these to be elected by the managers of the Hospital from Pupils recommended by the faculty of the College to serve for twelve months, unless removed for cause.

2^d The duties of the Senior House pupil, (accompanied by the Junior when practicable) shall be to take down the prescriptions of the attending physician, Surgeon and also the Senior when in the absence of the attending physician, Surgeon, shall prescribe for any new cases admitted, if he deem a prescription necessary, and shall prescribe in any emergency that may arise day or night, being careful to report the same to the attending physician. He shall keep a "case book."

3^d The duties of the Junior House pupil will be to carefully distribute the medicines to the various patients, to personally superintend as closely as possible, the administration of the same, to apply Cataplasms, blisters or cups, and administer enemata; and to perform all proper services required of him by the attending physician, or surgeon. He shall see that the nursing is faithfully done, and shall give personal attention to the thorough cleansing of the wards, the removal of deleterious or offensive matter and to the use of disinfectants and cloths, when required.

4th The compensation to be the necessary lodging, washing & fuel, together with Hospital fare, and one hundred dollars to each - W. Annam - viz - twenty five dollars, at the end of each quarter.

5th The interns, Senior & Junior will be required to give to the Hospital their whole time and attention, and to sleep every night at the Hospital - at no time shall both

Senior & Junior be absent at the same time.

The above rules & regulations were unanimously adopted, and the President was requested to notify the Faculty of the action of the Board.

The President reported, that he had notified the physicians elected at the former meeting of their election - and that he had received from each a note accepting the appointment.

cal cases, that the professor of theory
& practice of medicine should take charge
of all medical cases without reference thereto.

Savannah Poor House and Hospital.
 Editor Republican:

I send you a copy of the charter of the Savannah Poor House and Hospital, which I respectfully ask that you will publish for the information of the public. And it will be remembered that the question of reform as pertaining to this institution was agitated by many of our best citizens last year. The agitation of the subject at that time was conducive to some good, but it is evident to any one who knows the history and workings of the institution, that much yet remains to be accomplished before it reaches up to the full measure of our city's present requirements. It is, perhaps, not known to all those who generally feel benevolently interested in such things, that up to last year this institution has been what is properly denominated a "dole corporation" from almost its first organization, thirty-four years ago; and also that this disease has originated more from neglect than the nature of its charter. Indeed, it is evident from the terms of its charter that it never was intended to have been what has been marked out by its quiet, unobtrusive, not to say secret history. If the public will inquire into its history they will find that from its earliest inception it has been conducted by one or two exceedingly respectable citizens, but that in any long period no report, financial or other kind has ever been given to the public. The board of managers has perhaps been kept up to the feelings as required by the charter; but these managers have always elected themselves, and three-fourths of them paid little or no attention to its affairs, and it has been drifting along under the humane control of one or two persons, whilst the public, who are so deeply affected by such institutions, and who, when a such bodies are framed, should be ever kept about it one way or another. It is palpable this should never have been and certainly should be allowed no longer. Large sums of money, which certainly cannot be styled in any sense private funds, have gone into this corporation, and for aught we know have been properly laid, for to this body we would like to see the institution but we do contend, and that most earnestly, that the time has arrived when this business should be spread out in its influence for good. This growing city demands it—humanity equally demands it—every consideration demands it. Now the question comes up how is this to be accomplished? The charter says that every citizen who shall pay five dollars a year for his support shall be constituted a corporation equal with any other corporation, and they shall have the privilege of voting for seven managers, who shall hold office one year. This was one means contemplated by the originator to raise means to keep up the institution, beside other mentioned, such as auctions, duties, &c. It was based on the very foundation upon the policy (and that policy should never have been abandoned) of having as great a number of corporators as possible. Five hundred corporators would give two thousand five hundred dollars annually into the treasury, and we venture the assertion that this number can be easily obtained if proper steps are taken. There, perhaps, has not been a time for many years, when a very large number might not have been added to the list. This large sum would go a great way towards providing eggs, milk, &c., for the sick poor, who become so from dire illness, necessity—its inmates. Beside, through the increased vitality that would be infused into it by such a body of intelligent citizens. What a vast amount more of energy would mark its progress. And, again, if its influence was thus spread out how much more likely legacies would be left. This is surely the history of all such charities. This institution is faulty in no respect so far as its character is concerned, but that this impression has had the effect of keeping the public from joining it and

the time be come when the scales must be drawn from the eyes of the public, and they must be awakened to a sense that it depends upon them to make it what it ought to be. That it can be made the means of alleviating a great deal more suffering than it does there can be no doubt. There would be far less of this everlasting house to house begging, which every one feels annoyed daily by, for it will be remembered that this is a Poor House as well as a Hospital. The old Pennsylvania Hospital at Philadelphia, now over a hundred years old, is incorporated and was sustained upon the same principle. Its charter differs but little from this institution, and it has grown up to be one of the grandest monuments of charity of modern times. Had not self-subsisting, our city be made so in a few years, and a charitable argument to our city of which we will all feel proud.

Why talk of another hospital with such a number as we have, and besides, owned by the people? And this is a legitimate idea for some private funds have built up to what is now? Certainly no individual can say that it was by their private contributions that it has been made. Certain persons have given it, but this was in the public, and it now belongs to the public to utilize these bequests. These things being true, what becomes our duty at the present but to all unite and around this nucleus form a noble and enduring charity? Then, let all feeling, if there be any, be laid aside, or buried in the common weal, and let us by one great concerted effort make it what it should be. To carry out in proper style we feel that the present managers should call a meeting of the present corporation, and all those who desire to become corporators, and all who feel interested in enlarging its influence, and from this one step much good will surely follow. I ask now in conclusion, can there be any objection to this course? More when.

CHARTER OF THE SAVANNAH POOR HOUSE AND HOSPITAL.

- Assembled December 28th, 1835
- AN Act to incorporate the Savannah Poor House and Hospital.

That for the due conduct of the said corporation there shall be elected by ballot, on the first Monday in February next, and on the first day of February annually thereafter, seven managers; and that at each election a plurality of voters shall elect; and each person who shall have contributed the sum of five dollars or more to the purposes of said institution, shall be entitled to vote.
 - III. That from and after the passing of this act certain duties, payable to the State in the county of Chatham, be and the same are hereby given and appropriated to the support of the said institution; and the same shall be collected by the corporation, of the State, and paid over to the managers of the said institution; Provided, that the said appropriation may be by any future legislature withdrawn and withheld when considered proper so

REPORT.

In accordance with the wish of the Managers, I have endeavored to collect some information in relation to the early history of the Poor House and Hospital. There was a Poor House and Hospital in Savannah in 1733, and it was kept up in a small way to 1817, when which time the present Hospital was projected, and was used without a charter, by private enterprise. In the year 1835, Mr. Joseph Cunningham, a gentleman of enlarged views, took upon him to have the Hospital placed on a more permanent footing and for increased usefulness, and to that end he took the necessary steps to procure a charter and an appropriation from the State of the State auction tax, which was at that time levied at \$100, and which, as far as I can learn, had previously been collected by the State and became a part of the State funds. I am so definite records in reference to the Hospital, until December, 1835, when the present charter was obtained, having been passed by the Legislature on the 26th of December of that year. On the 26th December, 1835, the Hospital was incorporated, and forty citizens became members by the payment of \$5 each by thirty, \$10 each by six, \$20 each by two, and \$50 each by two. Of the original Corporation, only one (the present President), continued his connection as a member and manager. Six others of the original forty are still living.

On the 11th of February, 1836, an election was held at the office of Joseph Cunningham, Esq., and the following gentlemen were elected Managers: Joseph Cunningham, Ralph King, John Gardner, Matthew Fayline, Wm. Dinsan, Cass S. Henry, C. H. Carter, and on the following day the Managers met and elected J. Cunningham, President.

The original Managers, then elected, commenced negotiations with the sum of \$550. On the 31st of April the Managers met and adopted a plan presented by Mr. Cunningham, the President, and subsequent meetings on 11th May, 1836. The Treasurer's report was presented, showing a balance on hand of \$117 24. On the 26th June it was \$191 85. On the 10th August it was \$277 87.

In the meeting in May there is mention made of a legacy of \$4,000 from Thomas Young, Esq., the same being a bond of James Henson of South Carolina, which was ordered to be called for, it being in the hands of his executors, and that legacy is the first to the Hospital, and has been the nucleus of the Hospital fund, and from that small beginning the Hospital fund has attained its present condition.

At a meeting on the 31st of February, 1838, it appears that Mr. Cunningham declined re-election as President, and James Tupper, Esq., was duly elected, and Wm. P. Hunter and Wm. B. Clark were elected Managers at a subsequent meeting on the 12th February, 1838.

At a special meeting of the Managers, held May 30th, 1838, James Tupper resigned the Presidency and membership on account of ill health, and Wm. P. Hunter and Wm. B. Clark were elected Managers, and was duly elected President. At a meeting on the 31st June following, Messrs. Charles H. Johnston, J. W. Neville, Wm. P. Hunter and James Tupper were elected Managers in the place of Ralph King and James Tupper, resigned.

which is something less than seven hundred dollars for each patient of seven hundred treated during the year. - This seems quite moderate when compared with some hospital reports in England & Scotland which I have seen. Some of them as high as £10 & £12 for each patient equal to \$60 or \$70 a year.

The Treasurer's accounts for the year have been examined by a committee of your board viz W. West & C. Brown and the same have been found correct & supported by the proper vouchers showing a balance in hands of the Treasurer of \$3000.⁰⁰ A small sum to begin the year with; but look for a handsome appropriation by the County, through the board say of the ordinary, and with the state auction tax, dividends on stocks & bonds and from foreign seamen and contributions, will probably carry us through the year, unless we should have some extraordinary expenses, from epidemic or other cause, in which event we might have to realize on some of our assets. - The loss of the American seamen deprives us of a valuable source of income; I have the pleasure to say however that we get most of the foreign seamen, and will be very glad when I tell you that of 125 of such treated during the year, only 3 died & 2 of them were brought to the Hospital moribund. - I have heard that the seamen prefer our Hospital and when they have the choice come to us, saying the treatment there

better than elsewhere -

I appended to this report, a report from the Superintendent of admissions, discharges and deaths for the Year, which I consider a very favorable index of the good management of the Hospital, in all its departments -

Kollock in the meantime attends to the apothecary department as well as to his regular duties, as intern - and - in addition to these, he has in great measure discharged the duties of Mr. Bowen late Steward, since he left the Institution. I would cheerfully recommend a liberal compensation to him for these extra services more on finances in a condition to warrant it. I leave it with the board to suggest what under present circumstances they may deem right.

D^r. Drucan at my request, gives his attention also to the apothecary department, as well as to some of the duties of Steward.

D^r. Kollock, terms of service expires on 1st March next, and I am not advised of his views for the future, all which is respectfully submitted.

P.S. I beg to suggest that I be authorized to publish the statement of admissions, discharges & deaths for the year

as furnished by the Superintendent.

The Board then proceeded to the election of Superintendent and D^r. Drucan was duly elected.

It was on motion of Mr. Gerra resolved that a donation of fifty dollars be made to D^r. Kollock at the close of his term for his faithfully discharged duties during the past Year.

Mr. Gerra moved & the same was adopted, that the sum appropriated at a previous meeting for the purchase of medical books for use of D^r. Newman in Hospital practice, now rendered unnecessary by his appointment to an other Institution, be presented to D^r. Drucan as an evidence of the high appreciation of the board of his valuable services in the Hospital -

During the past year, a large number of applicants other than residents of Savannah have asked for admission into the Hospital, some of them coming from adjoining States, and others from adjoining countries in this State for the express purpose of seeking Hospital privileges, while I have endeavored to exercise a proper discrimination in granting permits, I have found it very difficult to refuse a helping hand to many of these applicants and have granted them admission into the Hospital. It is proper that I should call the attention of the Board to this matter, as I can readily perceive that the Hospital is being used as a Home and Asylum for the sick poor of the surrounding country. In July of last year, I made strenuous exertions to secure the contract with the U.S. Government for the care and comfort of sick and disabled American Seamen. In this I was assisted by strong certificates from the British Consul Mr. Tucker Smith Esq, and the Norwegian Consul C. Holst Esq, both of whom continue to send the sick of their respective countries to the Savannah Hospital, and thereby assist materially in maintaining the Institution. The Hospital building is in good condition and at present amply adequate to meet the demands upon it. The Attendants generally during the past year have been amiable

Dr. Arnold offered the following Resolutions and Resolutions which was unanimously adopted.

Whereas—

This is the first regular meeting of this board since the death of Dr. John S. Kelly, for nearly twenty years our associate, it is proper that we should set on record our testimony as to his services as a manager of "The Savannah Hospital."

It was in the period of our great distress in the terrible epidemic of Yellow fever of 1854, that the genuine benevolence of his nature was exhibited. He was almost the only manager left in the city and on him devolved the entire duty of conducting the affairs of the Hospital the refuge & asylum of the destitute.

This duty he performed faithfully and efficiently visiting the Hospital daily, until in the last of the season, he was himself stricken down and came near to paying the forfeit of his life.

Since that time he has been an earnest worker with us.

His intense and good feeling in the cause of actual & practical benevolence which finds its highest expression in a well conducted Hospital culminated in his determination to leave to it a handsome legacy which he has done in his last will & testament.

Therefore

Resolved that we cherish his memory with feelings of genuine esteem and respect, and that in testimony of this and as a memento of his generosity, the board will obtain a portrait of him to be placed in some proper position in the Hospital building.

Dr. Arnold & the president were appointed a committee to procure the portrait.

The president was requested to publish the above resolutions—

On motion the president was authorized to represent this board as one of the legacies of the late J. S. Kelly at the meeting of all the legacies to be called by the Executive.

The president stated that the funds on hand & receipts for the year would not be sufficient to meet the current expenses for the coming year and would probably have to be raised on some of our city bonds.

Resolved that the Hospital is open only to residents of Chatham County, and that the state of our funds requires rigid economy in their expenditures.

To amend an Act entitled an Act to incorporate the Savannah Poor House and Hospital assented to twenty sixth day of Dec^r in the Year 1835

Section 1. The General Assembly of the State of Georgia do enact, that the ~~act~~ assented to the twenty sixth day of December in the Year Eighteen Hundred and thirty five, entitled an Act to incorporate the Savannah Poor House and Hospital be and is hereby so amended as that the said Corporation shall hereafter be called, and known as the Savannah Hospital, and not the Savannah Poor House and Hospital as heretofore, and further that the Annual Payment for membership in said Corporation shall be ten Dollars and not five Dollars as heretofore and further that the annual election of managers of said Corporation shall hereafter occur on the first Monday in February ^{and not on 1st day of January} as heretofore, and each and every person who shall have contributed the sum of ten Dollars or more to the purpose of said Incorporation shall be entitled to vote.

Section 2. And it is further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that the act to be effect, and go into operation on immediately after its passage and that all acts and parts of acts so far as they militate with this act, are hereby repealed.
