Board of Managers met pursuant to Resolution C. Green
W.B. Knapp, Dr. Johnston & Dr. Hopkins;

the minutes of last meeting were read & confirmed.

The president reported Sale of two City bonds of \$500 each at 85 = \$850. —

He also reported a deficiency of funds to meet present indebtedness, viz due Dr. Green for a attorney \$228. - Jaggit for Coal \$30. - Jackathorne & Son \$120.
\$295. 81- Plumber for work for 14 Years, \$185.

Bracker for vegetables 15⁸⁰

Whereupon the following resolution was offered by Mr. Green seconded by W.B. Knapp:

Resolved that the president in view of the immediate exigencies of the Hospital be authorized to dispose of 4 (four) of the city bonds of \$500 each upon the best terms applying proceeds to payment of debts now due & the future current expenses of the establishment - and same was unanimously adopted.

The president stated that it had come to his knowledge by complaint of the Captain of the Br. Steamer Wm. Livingston who had some of his seamen in the Hospital. On one occasion visiting them as usual, he expressed himself as well pleased with the attention to comfort of his men, but was shocked to see three or four females in the seamen's ward, and one familiarly seated on the bed with one of his seamen. He was so disgusted that he left saying that he had never seen any thing like it, in all his visits to various Hospitals. He made this statement to his Consignor who communicated the same to the president.

Whereupon Mr. Green offered the following which was unanimously adopted:

"It having come to the knowledge of the board of managers that inmates of the female ward

are in the habit of visiting the marine patients in the seamen's ward it is ordered that the attention of Dr. Hollcock & Mrs. Calder be called to this occurrence that they be remissive of the expense rates of the Hospital against such visitors and requested to carefully guard against their repetition but further ordered that copy of this minutes be furnished to Dr. Hollcock & Mrs. Calder for their government."

Dr. J.H. Johnston was appointed physician of the Medical department till 1st Nov next
Dr. Challock to the Surgical & Dr. Hollcock to the female ward.

Mr. Johnston moved which was duly seconded that the president be authorized to engage legal counsel, if necessary, to determine what the State octroi tax is, and to suggest a way of enforcing the same which was adopted. The return from the item has dwindled to \$55 for a year when in previous years it yielded to the Hospital sums varying from \$4000, \$1200. — Advertiser claim that the State reduced the tax from 10 per cent to a quarter of one percent, which may be so, but even at that it should yield more \$55 if correct returns are made of sales.

The board adjourned H.D. pres't.)

that it will be necessary to dispose of
some of the securities to pay present indebted-
ness & provide for succeeding debts -
whereupon the following resolution offered
by Mr. Green & seconded by Mr. Knapp
was unanimously adopted -

viz - Resolved that in view of the debts
now due by the Hospital & those further ac-
crewing the president be authorized to dispose
of 50 (fifty) shares of the S. Western RR Road
Stock, held as the property of the Hospital,
appropriating proceeds to the discharge of all
claims against the Institution -

The president called the managers
attention to a proposition which he
thought would redound to the credit of the
City - viz - that this board should transfer
to the City, all their right & title to the
Hospital & adjoining grounds, and all their
property & securities to the amount of over
\$40,000, on condition that the city shall
have erected a hospital suited in every
respect to the wants, now & prospective of
our growing city, the same to be approved

by the managers of the Hospital the care and conduct of the same, to rest in the city of Savannah.

The proposition to be acted on at a subsequent meeting of the board.

Mr. Johnston offered the following resolution.

That the president make out an estimate of auction taxes that should have been paid by sundry auctioneers for the past nine years and that a demand be made of the city for the same as it is through the laudice of the city that the amount were not collected.

The resolution was laid over for the present. The president notified the board that the annual election of 7 Managers will take place on Monday 2^d feby in terms of the Charter & he appointed Col Knapp J.W. Nevitt & J.H. Johnston to superintend the same.

The board then adjourned.

Should I teleport transfer by affidavit
executed by J. J. Kelly, of 618 Park Row, to
the Hospital by our late associate John J. Kelly &
the same is confirmed under date of Nov 1st 1874,
1874, to Messrs. Sawyer, & Co, commencing 1st Dec
last.

I beg to renew my suggestion at last meeting that
a negotiation be initiated for the sale of Hospital and
Hospital grounds, and that the latter belong to the
Hospital fund to the City of Savannah on such
terms and conditions as the Board may appear to
be able and I suggest that a committee be appointed to
instruct them of such transfer to be submitted to the Board
and if approved, then to be presented to the Mayor and
aldermen for their action.

Also beg to call your particular attention
to the resolution of Mr. Johnson laid over from last meeting
in reference to State auction taxes. I hope the Board will
adopt some vigorous action in this matter. There are
doubt in my mind that at a the bounded day of the 4th
of September the collection of these taxes. The act of the legislature
in donating the State auction taxes to Chatham Co
to the Hospital say in section 5th of the Charter that the same
are given for the support of said Institution, and that
"the same shall be collected by the Corporation of Savannah
and paid over to the managers of said institution."

This is a matter of so much importance that I hope
the claim against the City will be pressed.

It will not astonish me if a rigid examination of
Rutherford's books will not disclose a delinquency of
over \$14,000. I suppose it may be difficult to get
the Auctioneer's books, and that they probably prefer
a compromise rather than bring their books out
(etc.) The sixth is purely the business of the City
and if the Board will hold them to a strict discharge

hitherto by the non receipt of dividends in the
Rail Road stocks, and

assist in providing hospital accommodations
to the poor & needy.

Offered by Mr. Hopkins that the City provide

of the Hospital to place memorial tablets
in honor of the donors to the Hospital
viz: Thomas Gurney - James Wallace, Esq.
John J. Kelly,
(the meeting adjourned)

President, announced the appointment of physician

The president reported that he had looked

requested & empowered to employ Mr. Green

City Council and the Savannah Hospital
The Atlanta Herald's correspondent in a recent letter from this city, has said, in view of a matter of considerable interest in this community:

About the middle of last March, the City Council receives a proposition from the managers of the Savannah Hospital, a private charity, "to turn over and resign to the city as soon as the city shall have built a hospital adequate to the wants of the community and as shall be approved by the aforesaid managers, all right, title to the present buildings and grounds, and to make over to the city in *perpetuum* all the property, real and personal, of which the institution may then be possessed. This proposition was received with evident approbation at the time by all classes of the community, and it was generally believed that the city authorities, impressed with its liberality, would promptly accept it.

It was conceded that the city should have a hospital, and here was undoubtedly the best opportunity for securing such an institution, that would probably never offer. Every reason was in favor of its acceptance, but what was the result? The economical and wise committee to whom the matter had been referred, after sleeping over it for two months and more notwithstanding, according to the newspaper reports, an intimation was received from the managers that they would like to know what was going to be done, suddenly came out with a recommendation that the proposition be accepted "whenver the financial condition of the city will warrant an expenditure adequate to the construction."

EQUIPMENT AND SUPPORT OF A NEW HOSPITAL

suitable to the wants of the community, again in accordance with the requirements of the existing laws.

It was rather vague and indefinite; in fact, a virtual declination of the proposition, and was so regarded by the managers, who promptly withdrew the offer.

The hospital is a private one, supported by voluntary contributions, and for over forty years, has been the asylum of the destitute sick, irrespective of nationality. The changed condition of affairs has rendered it difficult for the managers to retain the institution, and hence their proposition to the city. The refusal to accept the same necessitates a circumscribing of its charities, and hereafter the number of its patients will be limited to thirty.

In regard to Savannah, I know of no other city of similar size so utterly destitute of the means for relieving the unfortunate. Charleston, with all her evils of government, maintains several public institutions of charity, including a workhouse for the paupers, which is made self-sustaining almost, as under proper management, could easily be accomplished here. In Savannah, every benevolent enterprise is supported, there are several, and are dependent altogether upon private charity. This is wrong in principle, for the reason that there are many

That the aforesigned have been appointed a committee to memorialize your honorable body in manner appertaining to the Savannah Hospital, the nature of which will appear more fully by the following resolution unanimously adopted by the Board of Managers, at its successive meetings, after full and due deliberation had been given to the same, viz:

WHEREAS, The resources and income of the Savannah Hospital have become reduced from various causes, viz: The loss of its bank stock, the seizure of the same by the spoliation by Sherman's army, the loss of revenue from the Marine Department, the failure of the city to collect the tax from auctioneers, as provided by law, and lately by the non-receipt of dividends on its Central Railroad stock; and,

WHEREAS, The Savannah Hospital cannot be kept up except by the parting with its invested funds at prices below their value; and,

WHEREAS, The funds of the institution in a few years must by such a course be entirely expended in the maintenance of the city poor; and,

Copy of a Letter addressed to Mr. Smith January
1874

Sir, I take the liberty of enclosing copies
of the acts of the State in reference to state
auction tax in Chatham Co given for the
support of the Poor House & Hospital of
Savannah. These acts were copied for the

of the Sav' Hospital copy of the acts of the legislature

I recently submitted it to Mr. Guerard Esq.,
he examined the Tax Laws carefully and advised
me, that there has not been any repeal of the tax
law in reference to the Hospital - Here and the
following extract from Mr. Guerard letter to me of
May 1873. It is confirmed by a later letter April 2, 1874.

"In answer to your letter of 9th inst. I am pleased
to be able to say that after examination of the various
laws of the opinion that the grant to the Sav P.H. & H.
contained in the act of Dec^r 26 1835 of the amount
due, payable to the state in the County of Chatham
"has not been withdrawn or withheld" by the
legislature and that the same are due to
the Savannah Hospital."

The auctioneers made return to the City from
April 1866 till 1872^r a one quarter per cent on
their sales and since then they have refused
to make any further return, altho urged to do so as
I am told by the City Treasurer. The amount
now due of \$19 is left on their sales, now but
now amount to fifteen thousand dollars, but
many of them have ceased from business & could
not pay if ordered by law to do so. Some are still
in existence - and - altho I have not heard
a whisper of such intention, I suspect they
will apply to the legislature for a repeal or
withdrawal of the grant to the Hospital.

A meeting of the Managers elect was held
this day, present Wm Duncan R. Knapp J. H.
Nevitt J. H. Johnston R. Arnold J. G. Mills

The meeting was opened and closed
by calling Dr. Arnold - to the chair, on which
the action of the corporations, & of the managers
of election of Managers held last month was
read - & the managers of the board as reported,
were confirmed as such for one year, or till
their successors are chosen.

The first business being the election
of a president Wm Duncan was duly elected
and Mr. Duncan was duly elected Genl. Secy.

The president read his report of the condition of the Hospital for the past year, which was read and ordered to be entered on the minutes. The report of the Board of Accounted was read & received.

M. Green offered a resolution in memory of Mr. J. D. Hopkins late a manager of the Hospital, which was unanimously adopted. A copy ordered to be sent to the family - and to be published in the city papers.

In order to meet the expenses of the present year the president was authorized to realize on some five securities if need be.

It having been represented to the board that the matron is keeping cows & selling milk, it was resolved, that her time & attention may not be called off from her duty to the Hospital, she be requested to limit the number of her cows to one, which is deemed ample sufficient for her family use.

The president called the attention of the board to the matter of state auction tax & it was resolved that a Committee of three, of which the president shall be one be appointed by the president to take charge of that auction tax matter & to employ counsel for the prosecution of the claim against the State - and

The president nominated for that duty M^r. G. Green, M^r. J. G. Mills & president.

The report of the president is as follows:

Sav. 1st, 1875

I beg to present my report of the condition of the Hospital for the year ending Feb 1 - 1875

We commenced the year with cash on hand \$424¹² & have since rec'd \$82441.85 - making \$8665.97 and the expenses for same time have been (excluding of outstanding bills to J. H. Kelly) \$8420.12 leaving a balance on hand of \$245.85 - Included in the expenses for the past year are necessary repairs on the Hospital \$369. & expenses on the Kelly house including city tax & insurance

\$445.94 - For the coming year I think expense for a pauper will be less than the present year by three or four hundred dollars.

The Expenses for the past year are about \$300 less than for the previous year arising from reduction of Pauper beds to 30 & consequent reduction in subsistence expenses. The reduction is not as great as I had expected, nor can we expect the reduction to be in the same ratio of the reduction of pauper patients. We still have to keep up the corps of servants.

I think we can continue however to appropriate 30 beds for paupers - in the hope of some increase from seamen & pay patients - & in the hope of a dividend from our Central R.R. Stock as here needs. If that fails we shall be forced for means to pay current expenses.

The admissions into the Hospital for the past year have been 431 & the discharges for the same time 356 - for those particulars & other interesting details I refer the board to the "Circular" report.

The action of the board in the matter of turning the Hospital to the City on certain conditions was promptly attended to by the Committee, and no alteration in any shape was paid to the Committee proportion for over six weeks. When it was desired declined as per minutes of May 23. But subsequently an arrangement was made with the Mayor, that he should give permission into the Hospital to such paupers as in his judgment should receive them - & the Hospital agreed to receive such at the reduced rate of \$17 per week - & if death in any case causes future expenses to be paid by him. I thought this a fair arrangement under the circumstances, but suspect to say that he has seen fit to admit only paupers &c. during the last 9 months, whereas under the old arrangement, the admissions for that period would not have been less than 200 - A fair conclusion is that the Mayor has turned off many a pauper

that needed Hospital attention. Such was our practice when we were able to support them, to take in all, and free the streets of citizens from public beggars, which used this time and have been for months greatly increased.

I renew my recommendation at last annual meeting that steps be taken to compel the City to prosecute the auctioneers of Savannah for past auction dues, which by law it made the duty of Mayor Holderness to collect & pay over to the Hospital; but much dilatoriness in this respect may lead to an abandonment of the claim. I speak now that a Committee be appointed for the purpose.

At our last meeting our late associate Mr Hopkins was with us & engaged heartily in the business before us since then he has been called to his reward. A community mourns his loss & we as a board unite & contribute, at the loss of our associate, in his memory, a sum in his honor, and wise in his counsels. A befitting memorial by the board will be proper & I recommend that such be adopted.

The condition of the Hospital is good. I desire to commend the members to make visit there as often as convenient. If it interferes the patients and not to let them be engaged there on the alert up to their duty —

I recommend the election of Dr Duncan as Genl. Superintendent & the interval now there. I have long desired to get the matron keeping cows & selling milk as it takes off her attention from her duties in some measure. She has a fine or six at one time & carried on a heavy milk business. The board advised the number to be allowed to forty, I now recommend that she be limited to one which is quite enough for her own family's use. The said Superintendent has recommended this prompted to it from his daily observation.

My accts for the past year has been examined by Mr. Head, C. W. Johnston a Committee & found a correct & supported by proper vouchers certified by them. The balance of cash on hand being \$265⁷⁵ with outstanding bills of \$300 to \$350. The means to carry on the Hospital in the present year will not be adequate to the expense & some of our securities will have to be realized on —

1st. The Savannah Hospital has been devoted to the care & welfare of the sick paupers of the City for the past forty years during which period some 18000 & 20,000 have been its beneficiaries without a dollar of expense to the City.

2^d. The income of the Hospital is inadequate to its support,

and to meet current expenses. Its income has been greatly reduced by failure of dividends from Rail Roads and other stocks; also by the loss of American securities, from which a handsome revenue was received.

3. Because it is believed that property belonging to the Savannah poor House & Hospital is exempt from taxation by the law of the state - See Code of Georgia Article 1 S 729 page 1444 - Person's property exempt No. 6 all poor houses etc, houses, houses of industry and any house belonging to any charitable institution."

For the above and other reasons that might be urged, this petition is respectfully presented with the hope that Council will see the justice and propriety of the claim & grant the petition prayer for & also order the notice of sale for taxes by the City Marshall advertising the Savannah Hospital property for sale by resolution. The Managers & physicians work for the Hospital without compensation, and they do so cheerfully but think the City may well take so much of the burden off their shoulders in the interest of humanity today. - If the reason we have urged shall not be sufficient to secure our petition, it is believed that the law of the state if carefully examined will determine their action on just and legal grounds. -

The above having been unanimously adopted, the board adjourned

The adoption of Property from Taxe-

In view of the intent that it is manifested concerning the large amount of property exempted from taxation of this city, we give in full the report of Council on the subject of the Petition of the President of the Savannah Hospital for the remission of taxes paid on property belonging to this institution and its source of support. The report is as follows:

This Committee of the Whole Council to whom was referred the petition of Mr. Wm. D. Duncan, president of the Savannah Hospital asking that the sum of \$308.25 be paid on a tax paid on a building situated on the corner of Liberty and Jefferson streets, the property of the Savannah Hospital, and to exempt said property of city tax. The Committee, after consideration of the matter, referred it to the Mayor, recognizing the responsibility of the Hospital, and, consequently, in view of the large amount of property exempted from taxation with the number of buildings, the Committee has decided to grant the petition. It is shown in the recent issue of the Savannah newspaper, amounts paid on property of the Hospital, that the amount of taxes paid on the Hospital is less than the amount of taxes paid on the buildings of the Hospital, and, therefore, it is considered that the Hospital is not taxed to the extent promised to be still further added to, thus increasing the burden upon an already overburdened community. Your committee, therefore, recommends to your committee that the sum of \$308.25 be remitted to the Hospital as a minimum of tax, and as a source of revenue to the Savannah Hospital.

Your Committee, therefore, beg leave to report adversely to the petition.

The receipt for the Year amount to \$7,444.12 and Expenditure \$7,391.78 which leaves a balance to begin the next Year of \$49.34. We cannot hope to get along any better this Year than last unless we get help from our Rail road Stock = We could realize on our central RR Stock \$49 or \$50 but whether that would be judicious is a question. The opinion of some is that the Stock will never be better, while others think it must improve. I submit whether it would not be well to realize on 100 shares & place the proceeds where we might get 7 or 8% interest say in City Bonds or State of Georgia Bonds.

In compliance with Your instructions at last meeting I sent a petition to Council in reference to exemption of the Kelly house from city tax and the same was refused, see report of Mayor on their preceding page. It is for You now Gentlemen to determine what is best to be done, whether to submit to the justice or take legal

measures to resist and in what event to employ counsel. I enclose to You a note from Mr Charles Green secretary of the dining room at the Hospital for occasional visitors instead of persons who are at large constitute impunity as protection from wrongs of this kind. I shall ask You action thereon.
