present bonds, made this 24th day of June
one thousand eight hundred and five.

the said William D. Whitsky is by law the natural guardian to his
own child David G. Whitsky now of the said William D. Whitsky do
thoroughly renounce all his guardianship, agreeably to
law of guardianship, being ever since herewith, and agreeably to law,
