I George Mygatt of said State and County being of sound and disposing mind and memory, making that I must shortly depart this life, deem it right, good proper both as respects my family and myself that I should make a disposition of the property which at Kind Providence has blessed me, I do therefore make this my last Will & Testament, hereby directing and enjoining all others by me theretofore made.

First

I do not and doubt that my body buried in a decent manner yet, as possible as possible and suitable to my circumstances and condition in life. My soul I trust shall return to God who gave it, as I hope for Salvation through the merits and atonement of the blessed Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

Second

It is my Will that my son Joseph C. shall receive the sum of Twenty Dollars per annum during the life time of my beloved wife Elizabeth when I do here delegate and

appoint Trustees in this behalf and to that effect of all my property of whatever kind and wherever found I give to my beloved wife Elizabeth under the provisions of the bequest (above) as relates to the same left to be paid annually to my son Joseph C.

Fourth

I do hereby constitute and appoint my beloved wife Elizabeth Executor of this my last Will and Testament. This June 5th 1876
