I James Junkin Harrison of the said State and County, being of sound and disposing mind and memory, and being impelled with the uncertainty of human life, do make and publish this my last will and Testament, hereby revoking all wills by me at any time heretofore made. And first I commit my soul to God who gave it, and my body to the dust from whence it sprung.

Item, 1st

I do hereby give, devise and bequeath all the estate, both real and personal of which I may die seized or possessed to my beloved aunt, Priscilla Elizabeth Greer, (eldest of John C. Greer late of said County deceased,) and her son John Thomas Greer, for their mutual benefit and enjoyment during their two lives; and at the death of either, the said estate to go to the survivor, forever, in fee simple. And all that I may inherit from the estate of my deceased brother, Alonso Tyler Harrison, both real and personal, I also give bequeath, and devise to my aunt Priscilla Elizabeth Greer and her son John Thomas Greer in manner and form of the first bequest.

I also nominate and appoint my Aunt Priscilla Elizabeth Greer and her son John Thomas Greer my executors of this my last Will and Testament.

In witness whereof I, the said James Junkin Harrison, to this my will, have set my hand and seal the fourth day of September 1868.
